STRIKERS DROWN **NEGRO IN CHICAGO**

Throw Unidentified Man Into Creek Near Stockyards.

Chicago, Dec. 8 .- Fifteen hundred poicemen were sent to the stockyards early this morning, when, long before daylight, several groups of persons, in-cluding a few women, gathered about the stockyards. Last night's toll of casualties included one dead, nine seri-ously injured and an uncounted number hurt when mounted police charged into the crowd with drawn batons.

All saloons in the neighborhood of the yards were closed today by order of Chief of Police Fitzmorris. The chief said that the trouble would be

stopped at any cost.
