

WHAT CAN BE DONE WITH HIS LIQUOR?

Stratford Man in Quandary Because His Home Is Not Private Dwelling.

Special to London Advertiser. STRATFORD, Oct. 5.—What to do with some half-dozen bottles of good Canadian Club whiskey, his own property, is probably perplexing Ernest Sourbier today. A peculiar situation has arisen out of a local police court case in which Charles and Ernest Sourbier, Forman avenue, were charged with keeping liquor for sale.

Charles was convicted this morning and was fined \$500 or three months in jail. On the other hand Ernest was dismissed, and is allowed to keep his liquor. Charles' liquor is, of course, confiscated.

SPONSORS BRANCH BANK SYSTEM FOR CANADA
NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Sir Frederick W. Taylor, general manager of the Bank of Montreal, this morning spoke on the branch bank system before the convention of the American Bankers' Association, replying to critics who previously had attacked the Canadian branch bank system as "dangerous."

Without attempting to tell the bankers whether branch banking would be good for the United States, he declared it had worked out well in Canada, proving of exceptional value in the agricultural regions. Farmers, he said, frequently were able to borrow greater sums for crop handling from the big banks that had branches in their communities than they would be able to obtain from privately owned banks.

NEW GERMAN CURRENCY.

WITHDRAW 2 CAR FERRIES

C. P. R. Abandons Boats At Windsor, Preferring Tunnel Transportation.

Demands of Crews For Higher Wages Blamed For Change.

Special to London Advertiser. WINDSOR, Oct. 5.—The two big Canadian Pacific car ferries, Michigan and Ontario which, for nearly 30 years, have been in service transporting freight and passengers across the Detroit River here, have been permanently abandoned for the more modern method of tunnel transportation, it was learned here today.

The ferry owned by the Pere Marquette and which has a carrying capacity of 28 freight cars is now being used to move Canadian Pacific freight to and from the Michigan side, and has been put on continuous day and night run.

It is understood that this system will continue only until such time as arrangements can be made for handling all Canadian Pacific Railway business through the Michigan Central tunnel.

The placing of the two Canadian Pacific ferries in retirement throws perhaps 30 men out of employment, but some of them have been absorbed by the Pere Marquette.

Demands of men on the boats for an eight-hour day with an advanced scale of pay, had much to do, it is said, with the decision to give up operation of the two ferries. Captains on these two boats were receiving as high as \$350 a month for being eight hours on duty daily. A few years ago the skippers put in a twelve hour day for less than \$200 a month, while other employees were paid proportionately.

BIGGS AND PARTY VISIT WOODSTOCK

Special Committee To Investigate Motor Traffic Hears Recommendations.

Special to London Advertiser. WOODSTOCK, Oct. 5.—The special committee of the Ontario Legislature appointed to investigate the various acts respecting motor traffic in the province met a large number of citizens of Oxford County at a meeting held in the city hall this forenoon and heard many views expressed regarding the administration and enforcement of the motor vehicle act.

Hon. F. C. Biggs was in the party, and before attending the meeting he inspected the highway between Woodstock and Ingersoll. Fred Milman, president of the local Motor Club, presented a series of recommendations made by the club regarding the amendment of the laws respecting motor travel. The chief of these recommendations was that horse-drawn vehicles be asked to carry lights.

The motor club officials were satisfied with the present speed limit, but favored the enforcement of a law requiring all car drivers to be examined and licensed. Mayor Paul advocated the amendment of the clauses of the act which set a definite mileage per hour as the speed limit, and wished to substitute for them a clause simply saying that the speed limit should be a reasonable one for the safety of the public.

A discussion centered on the proposal to have special parking lights placed on all cars. Following the meeting the members of the committee were entertained at luncheon by the mayor and city council.

AMATEUR THESPIANS ORGANIZE AT SARNIA

SARNIA, Oct. 5.—The Sarnia Philharmonic Choral Society, which last year made a great impression in the county with its performance of the "Mikado," has decided to again take up Gilbert and Sullivan this season, and will present "The Yeomen of the Guard," commencing next week. The play will be staged in January.

BRANTFORD TO DISCUSS AID FOR FIRE SUFFERERS

Special to London Advertiser. BRANTFORD, Oct. 5.—It is expected that the city council will take some action to give material assistance to the unfortunate who are suffering from the forest fires in Northern Ontario. In discussing the matter, Mayor Parker stated that the matter was under consideration by the city council and that a definite decision would be arrived at during Monday night's session. "The news of the fire has come upon us so suddenly that we have had no time to give the matter our consideration, but I expect that some action will be taken to aid the suffering people." So commented his worship when asked about the matter.

A special meeting of the executive and members of the chamber of commerce has been called for tomorrow afternoon to discuss some means to aid the Northern Ontario fire sufferers. According to the reports, it is altogether likely that a subscription list will be started in order to send supplies to the fire-stricken regions. Last year as many as 2,000 grasshopper plagues were found in a square foot of soil in Southern Alberta.

ADJUST GRIEVANCES OF ST. THOMAS P. M. WORKERS

Special to London Advertiser. ST. THOMAS, Oct. 5.—The wage disputes in the shops of the Pere Marquette in Canada are practically settled, it was learned here Thursday. No further trouble is anticipated.

The reduced rates of pay, as awarded by the United States Railroad Labor Board in June last and

sustained by the board of conciliation that investigated the shopmen's case as being fair and reasonable, were made effective on the local division from Sept. 15. C. Montgomery, the divisional master mechanic, reported, and the last fortnightly checks, which arrived a few days ago, were accepted by the employees. The dispute between the Canadian clerical employees and the company also appears to have been settled. "Everything is lovely out here," declared Mr. Montgomery. "I haven't heard a word about any trouble for some time, and so far as I can find out, there isn't likely to be any either on this side of the United States."
