

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, June 26.-A resolution urging the dominion parliament to declaration of war, was adopted by the Great War Veterans Association convention here this afternoon during a discussion on world peace.

The conscription of property and manpower was urged. A similar resolution was recently presented to the United States Congress by the American Legion of

Ex-Service Men.
