

Bow-wow Show

In Full Swing

Philharmonic Hall is Crowded With Canine Aristocrats of all Sorts.

A List of the Prize Winners in Judging up to Last Evening.

If any Victoria youngster yesterday sang "Daddy Wouldn't Buy Me a Bow-wow," it was not because there were not "bow-wows" in plenty to be heard for there were hundreds of them, as residents in the vicinity of Philharmonic hall can testify.

The dog show—the third annual event under the auspices of the Victoria Kennel Club, now in progress, is a success. That is the opinion not only of the public, but of the officers of the association. Never has there been so numerous entries, stronger competition in the prize classes, and more interest on the part of the public.

The number of canines on exhibition exceeds last year's total of about twelve dogs, while the quality is the best ever seen in this city.

Checker boards have been set out this year with 65, the largest entry of the show, and the greatest number ever entered in Victoria. Colors are very pretty, and the dog show is a success.

English setters are the next largest class, with 50 entries, completely making up the balance of the show. These include nine dogs, puppies, four and a half, and one female.

The entry in fox terriers numbers 35, and while there are no excessively large classes, the quality is the very best that has been seen here, and would be a credit to the breeders in this city.

Colts have a banner entry of 25, with each well-bred, and of the best of the breed. Black Bay, Glen Tuna, Monk, Peck and Haywood, valued at \$5,000, are the best of the breed.

The Irish setter class is good with 20 entries, and several new dogs from the outside to try conclusions with the local breed.

Bull terriers show a very gratifying increase with 20 entries. Poodles, however, show a decrease from last season with only 12 entries.

Box terriers are, as usual, largely represented. Although only a number of outside dogs entered, the principal interest centers in the competition between Mrs. R. J. Brown, of Victoria, and Mrs. J. J. Bostock.

Probably the most marked improvement in this year's show over that of last spring is the wonderful increase in the number of entries of the various classes. The interest in the breed has increased to such an extent that during the past twelve months that class has increased from 12 to 25.

Local fanciers have entered a considerable number of dogs, and the general public has shown a marked interest in the show.

Ottawa, April 5.—Premier Laurier, in the House today, presented the modification of the Grand Trunk Pacific contract.
