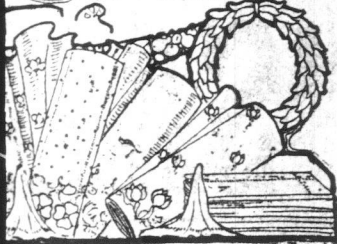

Roosevelt Party All Well
NAIVASHA, British East Africa, Oct. 22.—Col. Roosevelt, accompanied by R. J. Cunningham, arrived here yesterday. All the members of the expedition are well. Edmund Heller, the zoologist, returned last night, having made a trip to the summit of Mount Kenia, a height of 10,000 feet. Maj. Edward A. Mounts is continuing the ascent, hoping to reach a height of 15,000 feet. Mount Kenia is an extinct volcano rising 17,200 feet.

Bank Looting in Russia
BERLIN, Oct. 22.—Two men armed with the teeth raised an office at Simferopol, Russia, breaking open the safe and appropriating the contents. While being pursued by the police, the robbers threw a bomb, which exploded and killed a girl. The other, who was carrying a revolver, was shot dead. When one of the bombs found by the police at the place of the arrest was being examined it exploded, killing one policeman and severely wounding two soldiers and three workmen.

Long Island Mystery
HAMBURG, Oct. 22.—The Hamburg police, who under instructions from the German government, have been investigating the various clues in connection with the finding of the skeleton of the young woman near Islip, Long Island, are convinced that the body is that of Anna Latta, who formerly lived in Alsace, in Schleswig-Holstein, Prussia. She was married in February, 1908, to an architect named Mueller, and the couple started for New York. The police state that both are missing.

Railway Men Want Increase
BOSTON, Oct. 22.—A request for a general wage increase and betterment of conditions, including a ten hour maximum day for train drivers, was made by every railroad system east of the Mississippi, north of the Chesapeake and Ohio lines, and of eastern Canada, made before the annual convention of the eastern association of general chairmen of the joint board of arbitration and adjustment of the railway conductors' and trainmen's organizations, which closed its sessions in this city tonight. The resolution will be submitted immediately for a referendum vote to the men of each system.

Many Buildings Burned.

HUNTINGTON, Pa., Oct. 21.—A serious fire occurred early today at Huntington, near here, in which nearly a dozen buildings were burned, causing a loss of about \$100,000. Among the places destroyed was the Clarendon hotel.

Vancouver Clearings

VANCOUVER, Oct. 22.—For the third consecutive week the Vancouver bank clearings are well over the seven million mark. For the week ending October 21 the returns are \$7,498,978, as compared with \$4,152,448 for the corresponding week of last year.

Waist Makers Strike

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—A strike of the 4,000 members of the New York ladies' waist makers' union for higher wages and recognition of the union was voted yesterday. The strike will probably begin on Monday. They ask for a ten per cent. increase and a closed shop.

C. P. R. and Edmonton

EDMONTON, Oct. 22.—The C. P. R. agreement, providing for the extension of the railway company into Edmonton by means of the high level bridge and for the extension of the C. P. R. upon that bridge when the payment of \$588,000 is made by the city of Edmonton to the ratepayers, having been given its third reading at an adjourned meeting of the city council yesterday, the agreement will be at once advertised and voted upon by the ratepayers on Thursday, November 18.

Death of General Otis

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Gen. Elwell S. Otis, U. S. A., retired, died yesterday morning at his home in the town of Gates, just outside this city. Heart trouble, with complications, chief of which was an affection of the kidneys, was the cause of death.

Fire in Gladstone, Man.

GLADSTONE, Man., Oct. 22.—A fire which broke out in Leaman's bakery here today destroyed the telephone office, Galloway Bros. cattle dealers' office, the Gladstone Jewellery Co., Connors' Drug Store and several other buildings. Loss about \$25,000.

Oppenheimer Memorial.

The outcome of the gatherings was the decision to have the memorial take the form of a 150,000 stone arch, triple in form, and provided with ornamental gates, at the immediate entrance to Stanley park over the old bridge. The structure will span a causeway 100 feet wide, and the proposal made last evening was that Augustus St. Julien, one of the foremost sculptors and designers on the continent, should be asked to carry out the plan.

New York's Contest
