Moncton, N.B., Nov. 17.—Miss Nancy Ferguson, aged twenty, who was severely burned on November 8 while baking bread died this morning. Only an unusually strong constitution enabled her to keep up an eight days' fight for life. She was a daughter of George Ferguson of the Moncton Tramways Electricity and Gas Company's electrical department. This is the second death in the family in a short time, a young brother having been drowned in Hall's creek a few months ago.

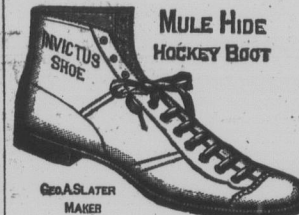
