This man fired three rounds at the Naniwa, one shell entering the engine-room of the Japanese ship, another smashing her fore-bridge. The Naniwa then hauled off. The Chinese admiral rewarded the surviving gunner with a present of 1000 taels. A shell glanced from the steel deck of the Chen-Yuen, and went through her tower, shattering everything therein. A lieutenant, who was in the act of speaking through the tube leading to the engine-room, was blown into atoms, and his head was left hanging to the speaking pipe. Huge fragments of armor and the teak backing the roof were carried inboard by shot, crashing a large number of sailors into a shapeless mass. A European engineer who was groping about in an endeavor to repair a steam pipe was drenched from head to foot with the blood of an assistant, who was disemboweled by his side by a shot from the enemy's ship. The Chen-Yuen arrived at Wei-Hai-Wei the day after the fight in the same condition in which she left the battle. No attempt had been made to wash the blood from her or to remove the corpses which strewd her decks."

BUT WILLIAM GIBLIN ESCAPED A

MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE, Hit With a Missile and Knocked Down, Striking His Head On a Curbing and Receiving Injuries From Which

He Died. While returning home from school on Monday of last week a number of boys, among whom were William Giblin, 178 William-street, and Harry Fletcher, 29 McCaul-street, became engaged in a

free fight in St. Patrick's-lane. Struck*With a Cedar Block. During the fight Giblin struck Fletches on the back of the head with his fist, This caused young Fletcher to turn and walk away. As he did so eye witnesses of the occurrence say Giblin threw a cedar block, striking Fietcher in the back and knocking him down, his head coming in contact with the curbstone. He was picked up and taken home by William Patterson, 19 Carr-street, and Dr. Young called in.

No serious results were anticipated until Sunday morning, when Fletcher was taken with convulsions and died in a few hours. Dr. Young, who had been in constant attendance, notified Coroner Johnson, and he issued a warrant for an inquest, which was held at the American Hotel yesterday afternoon.

The post mortem examination made by Drs. Young and Harrington shows that death had been caused by diffusive in flammation of the brain, resulting from the injury sustained in the fall against the curbing. Died in Convulsion

Should Be Put a Stop To. During his address to the jury Dr. Johnson expressed himself strongly as to the danger of these street fights among larger boys, which are now becoming so common. Some strict measures should be taken to effectually stop them.

Released From Custody.

Young Giblin, who had been taken charge of by Detective Harrison, was present during the inquest and treated the whole affair as quite a good joke, entirely disregarding the serious charged which might be laid against him.

After a short deliberation the jury decided they would scarcely be justified, owing to some contradiction in the evidence, in bringing in a verdict of many slaughter against Giblin, and returned the non-committal verdict of 'Death from meningits.' Giblin was dismissed from custody, after being reminded by the coroner of the serious nature of his act, and warned to be more careful in future.
