Scarboro School Board. The school sections of York and Scarboro, the Chancellor gave his decision on Saturday as follows: The Township of Scarboro having passed a by-law in 1894 to divide (old) school section 10 into two sections, now known as school sections 10 and 12--that by-law is by the statute of 1891 (54 Vic. c. 55, s. 31, sub-section 3), to remain in force for a period of five years, unless set aside as therein provided, which appears to be by way of appeal. That by-law being still operative under the opinion of the Chancellor, the Township of York is apparently free to act, but that does not release Scarboro from the operation of an Act of Parliament, so far as the locality is concerned. I would therefore answer the first question in the negative. To the second question, I would say that, in my opinion, an award under the 87th section of the Act of 1891 is not valid, when made by only one arbitrator, though he be the inspector. The third question is answered by the response to the second above. The fourth question relates to the power to add the county judge as arbitrator under section 87, sub-section 2, where there are three municipal arbitrators and one official arbitrator, making an even number of four. There is in my opinion, as the words "so appointed" are not to be read as limited to arbitrators appointed by the municipalities. As to the fifth question, whether part of school section 12, Scarboro, can be attached to school section 10, in my opinion the statute does not justify such a course. To the sixth question it is not needed to attend in view of the opinion expressed as to the first, but the matter would seem to be rather for the discretion of the municipal bodies, as to the form of the application and award, assuming that jurisdiction existed in respect to the formation of a new union school section.

The Anglican and Catholic Clergy Not to Blame.
