tice had obtained from the time of Mr. Fox himself, and that it was indispensable upon certain occasions. Mr. Duncombe complained that the system had not only been enforced in London, but generally through the country Post-Offices for the last two years, and offered to prove this, if a committee were granted to him. A secret committee consisting of four ministerial and five opposition members was appointed to examine into the question. The subject seems to have excited a good deal of attention in England, and there is obviously justice in the cesire of the public to ascertain upon what grounds and to what extent the practice has been carried. Great caution should be exercised in such an infringement of the rights of the subject, since nothing would be more warmly resented by the people at large or more likely to impair their confidence in the administration of the duties of that branch of the public service.

DR. Wolfr's expedition to Bokhara had brought him within three days' journey of that place at the date of the last accounts received from him, which was the 12th of April. The Reverend gentleman himself expressed his be-- lief that both Col. Stoddart and Capt. Conolly were alive: but Sir Robert Peel, in answer to a question put to him in the House of Commons, avowed his fear that, as far as regarded Captain Conolly, the accounts of his violent death were but too true; and the hope of Col. Stoddart's preservation seemed to be founded only on the report of his having become a Mohammedan.

WATERLOO BANQUET .- On the 18th ult., F. M. the Duke of Wellington gave his customary banquet at Apsley-house to the surviving officers engaged with him in the memorable field of Waterloo. His Royal Highness Prince Albert was present upon the occasion, together with General Prince Castelcicala, the Neapolitan Minister, who was engaged at the memorable combat. The guests numbered one Field Marshal; two Generals; six Lieut.-Generals; thirteen Major-Generals; thirty-five Colonels, and nine Lieut,-Colonels, all Waterloo-officers, and some of the most distinguished in the British service. The band of the Grenadier Guards (of which Regiment His Grace is Colonel) played, at intervals, select pieces of music.

Want of employment and destitution are supposed to be the causes which led to these crimes; though it may be safely asserted that the perpetrators of these acts of destruction would find it difficult to show in what way the loss of the property of the rich can add to the comfort or increase the means of the poor.

IRELAND. - Lord Heytesbury, G. C. B., formerly Ambassador at St. Petersburgh, Naples, Madrid, and Lisbon, has been appointed Lord Lieutenant, in consequence of the resignation of Earl de Grey, induced by ill health. The appointment seems to give satisfaction The Repeal Rent continues large, and the imprisonment of the conspirators is used to keep up the natural excitability of the Irish people. Mr. J. L. Arabin, a Protestant, has been elected Lord Mayor of Dublin for the ensuing year. Sunday the 28th July has been appointed a day of general humiliation and prayer among the Roman Catholics in Ireland, on account of the imprisonment of O'Connell.

FRANCE. There is nothing of consequence from this country. The dispute between it and the Emperor of Morocco was to become the subject of negociation, and the latter had disavowed the conduct of his troops in attacking the French. In the meantime the Prince de Joinville had sailed for Oran in Africa, with a fleet consisting of three ships of the line, a frigate, and four steamers, having on board in addition to their usual complement of men twelve hundred troops, including a company of engineers and three companies of marine artillery. The enterprizing chief Abd-el-Kader, who seems to be the irreconcilable and indefatigable foe of the French invaders of his country, receives shelter within the frontiers of Morocco, and, availing himself of the impetuous courage of the Moors, makes with them unexpected attacks upon the French which the Emperor of Morocco hitherto either has not been able, or has not thought fit, to prevent.

The other countries of Europe offer nothing worthy of particular consideration.

From Madagascan accounts are received which confirm the report of the destruction of an officer and seven men, of the British Frigate Cleopatra, mentioned in the Bereun of the 27th June. Lieut. Molesworth was the unhappy sufferer on this melancholy occasion.

Her Majesty and Prince Albert had honoured the Duke and Duchess of Sutherland by their presence at Stafford House upon the interesting occasion of the christening of their infant son. Prince Albert stood as Sponsor to the infant who was named Albert, after his illustrious Godfather. His Grace the Archbishop of York officiated, and a number of the highest nobility attended the that quarter put a stop to. auspicious event.

Earl of Aberdeen, in answer to a question from the Earl of Minto, said it was unfortunately too true that a great increase had taken place in the Slave Trade at Cuba; and he was sorry to say, that there was little or no exaggeration in the statement of the noble Earl. At an early period of the session he had expressed a very sanguine hope that the Slave Trade would speedily cease in the island of Cuba, owing to the great exertions of the Governor-General Valdez, who then ruled there. But he must say, that General Valdez had gone far beyond the intentions expressed, and the instructions given by his own Government, in carrying the treaty into effect; for, he believed, had the Governor of Cuba depended on the Covernment of Madrid, very little would have been done to check the Slave Trade. Before his recall he had done every thing in his power to carry the treaty with this country into effect. By his strenuous exertions the importation of slaves, which had been carried on to the enormous extent of 40,000 annually, was diminished to 3000, but he was very sorry to own, that in the first month of the present year, as many slaves were imported as had been imported during the whole of the last year of the government of General Valdez; he believed the noble Earl was quite right in attributing this increase of the Slave Trade to the change of system in the Government of Madrid, which it was to be feared had actually sent express orders to General O'Donnell, the new Governor, to relax the regulations imposed by General Valdez for its suppression. He need not say that nothing would be wanting on the part of Her Majesty's Government to prevent the continuance of this trade. He would however, rather not at present enter into any particulars as to the steps that had been taken for that purpose; but he could not but hope that they would be attended with success. noble Earl must be aware that all these treaties touching the Slave Trade had been but imperfectly executed by foreign powers. The noble Earl had only mentioned the case of Spain, but there was no doubt that the same observation might be made with respect to Brazil; for he was completely certain that, from one end of that empire to the other, the provisions of the slave trade treaties were set at nought. He hoped, however, that before long, improvement in this respect would be effected, both in Brazil and Cuba; and, undoubtedly, Her Majesty's Ministers would not relax their endeavours to cause those treaties to be respected.

African Enterprise .- Considerable curiosity was excited on Tuesday, at the St. Katharine Docks, in consequence of the arrival of a vessel from Bermuda, of only 41 tons' burden, manned entirely by men of colour, and having a cargo consisting almost entirely of arrow root, which has accom-plished the voyage in the incredibly short space of 31 days. This Liliputian vessel has only one mast, her sides are not more than from 12 to 15 inches from the deck, having a hand-rail raised above them of about the same height; the stern is quite even with the deck, open and unprotected; and altogether she has more the appearance of a yacht, than a vessel capable of performing a voyage across the Atlantic. Though so small, she is evidently of great strength, and has not a vestige of paint or ornament about her.—The Times, June 20.

We have been informed, that the abovementioned vessel has been entirely built, manned, and equipped by emancipated Negroes-that they were the sole growers and shippers of the cargo, and that their capital alone has been embarked in the speculation.

Dominica, West Indies.—An insurrection had broken out which caused great damage on the estates, but was speedily suppressed, so that on the 21st of June the operation of martial law was suspended. Ninety of the ringleaders were detained in prison for trial.

TEMPERANCE IN GERMANY .- Regulations have been published in the Duchy of Nassau, for the purpose of checking the frightful progress of inebriation. Every person seen in the streets in a state of intoxication is to be arrested and fined from five to ten florins, or imprisoned for a week or a fortnight; and by way of public exposure, the name of the offender is to be proclaimed by sound of trumpet. Any dealer in spirituous liquors who shall allow more than two small glasses to be consumed on his premises by the same person in one day, is to be fined fifty floring.

FIRE AT THE MONTREAL COURT HOUSE .-About half-past two o'clock on Thursday last the north-west corner of the Court House was discovered on fire, which soon extended through the whole building, as the wind was blowing hard from the corner where it caught.
