EXPO 86 — The World in Motion, The World in Touch — the international showcase dedicated to the theme of transportation and communication, is rapidly taking shape.



Two kilometres away, on Burrard Inlet, where the city of Vancouver was "born" 99 years ago, the sails of Canada Place are flying freely.

It hasn't all happened magically. Hard work by innumerable people has made it happen. Our own Department has been integrally involved from the very beginning. The Commissioner General, Patrick Reid; Bob Dawson and Dick Noyes Roberts, to name three, have logged in over 500 000 kilometres of air travel to promote international participation. Plus all our men and women abroad have, to greater or lesser degrees, been directly responsible for attracting so many international participantsincluding, for the first time at a North American exposition, all three superpowers: the United States, the Soviet Union and the People's Republic of China.


Hard work, yes; but it hasn't been without its lighter moments.
