We are facing a condition to-day which is not temporary. The European countries have been able to build up their own grain production and have increased their ability to get along without our wheat. It is my opinion that it is dangerous to work on the basis of thinking that we are facing an emergency for only this year. I may be wrong, but to my mind it is likely to continue over a long period of years. I wish I could think we could get rid of some of this economic nationalism, this dictatorship mentality, which exists in Europe, but there seems to be no prospect of that from what we read in the daily press. A wheat conference is to be held in London, and later on a world conference may be held. The large exporting countries such as the United States,

Canada, Argentine and Australia should endeavour to work together and not cut each other's throats as has been done on some occasions. At one time Argentina cut the price on the world market. We should work together to try to do something in the way of a long range plan and endeavour to do justice, not only to western Canada but to the country as a whole.

Mr. QUELCH: I move the adjournment of the debate.

Mr. MANION: I may go on.

Motion agreed to and debate adjourned.

At 11.02 p.m. the house adjourned, without question put, pursuant to standing order.
