## Mr. Carter: May I call it six o'clock?

**Mr. MacLean:** Perhaps it might be possible to pass at least the first item. There would be no restriction on members of the committee raising any points they might wish to raise on individual items as we go through the estimates, but I should appreciate it if there were any possibility of passing the first item.

Mr. Chevrier: If the hon. member is allowed to make his speech as if he had made it on the first item, I do not think there is any objection. I do not refer exclusively to the hon. member who has just risen. There are other hon. members who may wish to do the same thing.

**Mr. Regier:** In that case I should like to have the same courtesy extended to me.

Mr. Sinclair: Six o'clock.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Mr. Speaker, may I say that we are prepared to agree to any arrangement regarding the business for Wednesday which can be settled between the leader of the house and the hon. member for Laurier, provided we can be told what that arrangement is.

**Mr. Green:** I will take into consideration the suggestion made by the hon. member for Laurier and endeavour to let him know on Monday.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Be sure to let us know too.
