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in the same field, describing their works and giving brief account of their history." * In view of all this. noteworthy that, after thirty-two years, the small edition 450 copies that was offered to the public at cost price is yet exhausted.

dynas Harrisse in 1872 published a supplementary vol entitled "Bibliotheca Americana Vetustissima A Descriof Works relating to America, Published between the ! 1492 and 1551: Additions Paris: Librairie Tross." (44) 199 p. 200 copies in 8°, 50 copies in 4°.) This volume is properly speaking, a continuation of its predecessor, series of notes and additions "intended to aid towards for a complete list of works relating to the discovery, his and geography of America, printed previous to the years It contains bibliographical notes gathered in the leading braries of Europe, and 186 articles, two-thirds of which new. The other third is composed chiefly of description visu of extremely rare editions, which Harrisse had succi cited on the authority of other bibliographers, or public only in the appendix to the "Bibliotheca Americana W tissima."

Harrisse was born in Paris in 1830. When quite y he came to the United States to join his family, and South, where he taught modern languages to support him while he was studying law. He received the degree of I from the South Carolina College, read Blackstone with Hon. W. W. Boyce, and prepared himself for the barin Law Department of the North Carolina University. Hon. Stephen A.
