PAY SHEET PADDING WAS NOT CRIMINAL

But It Was Foolish, Said Judge Morgan in Cumming and Richardson Case.

There was no conspiracy to defraud the city on the part of Rutherford Cumming, Fred L. Richardson and Solomon Thompson, in connection with the alleged "padding" of pay sheets on work done on the intake pipe, was the decision of Judge Morgan, handed out yesterday at the city hall.

His lengthy judgment he says in part that the settlement agreed upon between the city and the contractors had not influenced him in any way in the proceedings. He said they found guilty of the charge, however, the settlement would have influenced him in sentencing.

With regard to Richardson and Thompson, said his honor, it had not been shown that they had any personal interest in the padding of the sheets.

In concluding, Judge Morgan intimated that had the city taken other means of bringing the contractors before the criminal courts they might have proved more successful.

NATIVE LABORERS JOIN RAMP STRIKE

Reappearance of the "Black Peril" Is Feared by White Population.

JOHANNESBURG, S. A., July 8.—(Can. Press.)—Six thousand native black laborers from three of the large gold mines on the Rand joined in the labor upheaval this morning, and should the disaffection among them spread to the other 250,000 natives employed on the reef, it will mean that the white inhabitants will be confronted with the reappearance of the "black peril" which has been quiescent for some years.

The natives refused to descend into the mines until granted an increase of wages and 1000 of them employed in the mine broke out of their compound. They were, however, awed by the leveled rifles of the troops who had been imported to deal with this serious development, and they returned to their quarters.

Most of the blacks have donned red frocks in imitation of the white strikers, who they believe struck for higher pay and obtained it.

SHIPS AND RAILS

EARLTON WILL HAVE A LARGER STATION

Than One Destroyed—Danger of Bush Fires Not Yet Over.

From the ruins of the fire which destroyed the "Dismal" Northern Ontario Railway station at Earlton last week is to rise a station bigger and better than ever, said Chairman Englehart to The World yesterday.

The building destroyed cost more than five thousand dollars and was a credit to Northern Ontario, but since it was built the Elk Lake line running into Earlton has been constructed, and it has been decided to erect a larger structure of the same general design.

While the recent rain was productive of much good, Chairman Englehart emphasized the need of another heavy downfall before the danger of bush fires would be over. In many places the smouldering remains of the fire were still there.

The Grand Trunk ran a special train for the convenience of golfers attending the Canadian championship tournament last week, at the Toronto Golf Club, leaving the Union Station at 4.10 p.m. They are continuing it this week also. This train runs as far as Port Credit, and is the many summer residents along the line as well as the many members of the Toronto, Lakeview and Mississauga Golf Clubs.

TORONTO AND EASTERN RUNNING NEXT YEAR

Construction Work Will Be Almost Done Late This Fall.

The Toronto and Eastern Radial line from Bowmanville into Toronto, will be ready for full operation early next spring. The World obtained from the management yesterday positive assurance of this.

By the end of this week, the grade between Bowmanville and Pickering will be completed, and next week, early in the month, the steel will be set at work on the grade from Pickering west of Toronto. The steel is already laid from Bowmanville to the mile west, and a large force of men are now placed on laying the steel between there and Pickering.

While the completion of the line before the close of the season will be almost a physical impossibility, the attempt to get the steel right up to Toronto as near that date as possible will be made.

LEPROSY SCARE IN RHODE ISLAND

Man With Dreaded Disease May Have Been Sent to England.

NARRAGANSETT PIER, R.I., July 8.—William Comber, the 37-year-old son of Edward Comber, proprietor of a hotel here, has been sent to England, according to his father, to avoid differences which have arisen between him, the father and persons who opposed the granting of a sallow license to the resident of the town which that young Comber was sent away from Narragansett because he was suffering from leprosy, and because the health authorities of Rhode Island were anxious to assume the responsibility of his care in that island. There is no isolation hospital in which a case of leprosy could be cared for.

The Comber case has aroused intense interest among the amount of alarm apprehension in the minds of the several thousand summer visitors that Comber may have left behind him a trail of infection. The case opens up the century-old contention as to whether or not leprosy is contagious.

The father says that specific tests proved his son did not have leprosy, and reports that he had, the father says, circulated by enemies, who wanted to hurt his business and to get him out of the way of this criticism he decided to send him away.

EDMONTON LOAN IS HIT BY BALKAN WAR

EDMONTON, July 8.—(Can. Press.)—The significance of the new war in the Balkans has made itself felt in Edmonton civic circles. A cablegram has been received from Kleinworth, London, who took up a \$10,000,000 loan issue by the city this year, and who has already paid to the city some \$5,500,000. Proceeds of the debentures, drawing attention to the fact that war has been declared and the city should take proper heed of the fact that the loan for the cablegram is found in the fact that there is a war clause in the agreement with the city regarding the sale of debentures, and under the clause the firm might seek relief from the responsibility of carrying out the terms of their contract. If the company should do this, it may be necessary for the authorities to issue treasury notes in order to raise money to carry on present construction work.
