

Problem One of Temperature, Relative Humidity and Movement of the Air.

A great number of old and generalby accepted theories corcerning venti-lation and impure air have been recently upset by a paper which has been published by the Smithsonian Institution, in which it is set forth that the ventilation problem as essentially one of the temperature, relative humfdity and movement of the air. The ordinary tests of air for carbon dioxide are de-clared to be worthless. The percentage of carbon dioxide in the worst venti-lated room does not rise above 0.5 or ated room does not rise above 0.5, or, at most, 1 per cent, whereas the nor-mal concentration of carbon dioxide in the lungs is from 5 to 6 per cent. of an etmosphere. A great number of ex-periments and observations prove that percentages regarded as deleterious or deadly by hygienists are quite harm-less. It is also a fallacy to assume that a diminished amount of oxygen is harmful.
