5. PATAGONIA.

Patagonia has always been reprefented by geograpers as a barren inhofpitable country, and in a great measure destitute of wood, of any other incentive to colonization. The Spaniards however atempted it in 1581, built a town which they named Philippeville, and placed about four hundred perfons in it; but the celebrated English navigator Cavendish in 1587, found only one of the settlers alive on the beach : Twenty-three of them had fet out for the river La Plata and were never afterwards heard of, and all the rest had perished through famine; from which circumstances the place received the mame of Port Famine.
