together, has for Moral the Danger there is of having too potent Neighbours—
What must the Danger be then for Inferiors, where two, the most potent Neighbours, quarrel?——It is very well if the first do not receive many Blows in the Constict from both Sides, and at last have the Battle ended at the Price of their Property, which must be applied to asswage their Opponents. The most refined Politic then for all the subordinate European Powers, is to prevent as much as possible the War in America from reaching to Europe—— or even of its discontinuing in America.
