

Canada alone has exported, in 1802, wheat and flour equal to 1,509,086 bushels, being 173,022 bushels more than the amount now required. In 1825, wheat, flour, and bread equal to 898,992 bushels, being 62,928 bushels more than the amount required.

In 1827, all the North American colonies exported wheat, flour, bread, and other corn, equal to 877,465 bushels, being 41,401 bushels more than the amount required.

#### BOARDS.

Amount required in the West Indies from the North American colonies :—

Feet . . . 21,840,725.

Exported from the North American colonies in 1828 :—

Boards and deals, feet . . . . 78,146,761

Being more than three times the amount required.

#### SHINGLES.

Amount required . . . . . 17,264,915

Exported from the North American colonies in 1828 :—

No. 11,699,282

Being 5,565,633 less than the amount required.
