

WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may ha mestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskaichewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestager may live within nine miles of his homestad on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, sen, daughter, brother or sister.
