FARMERS CONCLUDE INDIGNANT TALK

Decide to Send Committee to Ottawa to Watch Interests.

FEW AT FINAL MEETING

Much Heated Discussion Towards the Close of Convention.

It was only after considerable explaining as to the folly of such a thing, that a delegate at the farmers' convention under the auspices of the United Farmers of Ontario, in the Labor Temple, Saturday, was persuaded to withdraw his motion and demand that the government be dissolved to dissolve the present Union government.

your committee was in Ottawa. I thought your members were ridiculous." He cautioned that moderation must be exercised, and said if a reasonable request was made it would more likely be granted than a request for the wholesale exemption of farmers.

A number of telegrams were read, some in answer to messages sent out on Friday. One from Hon. T. Green said he was going on in council of May 25 modified the conditions of that in April and stated that the only son of a widow could obtain exemption for himself.

A delegate called out "We knew that before. I consider that answer an insult to an intelligent audience." "Some of you men are voting home disappointed," said Mr. Halpern. "Yes," called some. "Well, for God's sake, don't. You expect too much. You are going to sacrifice your home to take your boy back with you. It can't be done. All we can do is fight it out—and we're going to do that."

At this point it was moved that the government be dissolved and a petition to dissolve parliament on the grounds that it was not representative of the people.

A member asked if the proper procedure would be to ask Sir Wilfrid Laurier to champion the farmers' cause.

"It's up to the Liberals and Conservatives to down this Union government," said another delegate.

Speaking to the motion, President Halpern said it would bring ridicule and make the farmers the subject of laughter. Others agreed that there should be no politics in the organization.

That refusal on the part of the government to accept the farmers' demand for a condition as prevailed in 1837 was the statement made by one of the delegation.

After some discussion the motion was withdrawn.

That demand be made to the minister of militia that drafts going overseas be given four days' leave of absence, was carried.

J. E. Latimer, Oxford, moved that the government be memorialized to win the war in the way that interests the farmers.

Mr. Halpern read an item from an afternoon paper, quoting Inspector Kennedy as having said that had he known the nature of the farmers' meeting he would not have permitted it.

The resolution committee brought in one main resolution which was carried unanimously. It was the effect that owing to the working of the order-in-council of April 20, relating to the M. S. A., many farmers had been without a man with the result that the number of farms was being soon pass out of cultivation;

The suggestion met the approval of the delegates and was carried with some length on the benefits to be derived from such a move.
