STRANGE FIGURES IN TEMPERATURES?

Extremes of Temperature Responsible for Strange Plant-Frost?

Official figures of temperatures in Toronto, as presented in yesterday's seue of one of the evening papers, showed that Toronto itself the day before sweltered in a torrid heat with the maximum temperature at 37 degrees in the shade. The weather observer, when approached as to the truth of these figures, stated that there was no dowbt as to the torridity of the weather, but that the temperature of 37 degrees was slightly below the actual temperature as recorded at the observatory. "As a matter of fact." actual temperature as recorded at the observatory. "As a matter of fact," said the observer, "our own recorded maximum temperature for Thursday was far in excess of that noted by you in an evening journal. In fact, there is a difference of 60 degrees between the temperatures recorded. Such differences may be said to apply only when something has gone agley with when something has gone agley with one or the other of the instruments, and, so far as our observations go, there is nothing amiss with our own instruments. I can only speak for our own instruments, however, and it might be advisable to ask the journal


