FOOD SCARCITY IN GOTHAN

hotels and Restaurants Have Strenuous Time Trying to Feed Too Numerous Guests.

New York, Jan. 20 .- More food has en eaten in New York City this week than during any other week in its history, and the great markets, with all their facilities, have been strained to supply the demand. This demand was for food of the best grades, for fresh provisions, for choice cuts, for selected stock, for that quality sought by those

able to pay for it. The city has well stocked markets enough, but the layer of cream is too thin to go around, particularly just now, when the normal demand is augmented by the daily presence of at least 200,000 strangers. About 400,000 pounds of butter was received in this city on Friday. More than 3,000,000 eggs were received on that day, and of poultry 1,800,000 pounds. Despite these quantities the stewards of the big hotels and restaurants are at their wits' ends to be sure in getat their wits' ends to be sure in get-ting the best.
