TWO VAULTS BLOWN OPEN.

Chicago, May 7.—Burglars early to-day entered the office of Joseph Letter, who became famous several years ago when he attempted to corner the wheat market, blew open two vaults and escaped with bonds said to be valued at \$100,000 to \$150,000. The building in which the office is located is within half a block of police headquarters.

The men had entered by the office by breaking the door with a sledge hammer, which, it is thought by police, had been covered with rubber or cloth in order to muffle the sound.

Clark Hat Co. Fail.

The Clark Hat Manufacturing Co., Limited, of this city, have gone into voluntary liquidation. The company moved here from London two years ago, and for personal reasons the directors have decided to wind up the business.

Mr. N. L. Martin, Toronto, has been appointed liquidator. The liabilities are reported to be about \$30,000, and the assets considerably in excess of this figure. It is understood that the assets will be disposed of on a block at an early date. The creditors are nearly all European and American concerns, and it is expected will be paid in full.

Shot by Mob.

Nashville, Tenn., May 7.—Marvin Winters was shot and instantly killed, and Thomas Stewart and his young daughter severely wounded during an affray at Stewart's home, near Pleasantview, Chatham County, Saturday night.

A few days ago Stewart received a letter warning him that if he and his family did not leave the neighborhood within ten days they would all be killed.

12000 Clear Makers Strike.

Easton, May 7.—A strike of union cigar makers of this city was started here to-day. It is estimated that about 12,000 unionists are out in an effort to force an increase of wages.

Dame Rumor's Guess.

Ottawa, May 7.—A rumor going the rounds is that Sir Eliezer Tachereau is to be appointed lieutenant-governor of Quebec. Coupled with the rumor is that Chief Justice Lacoste or Quebec will resume practice and Sir Louis Jetté take the justiceship.

THREE MONTHS FOR HOLLAND BUT NO WORSE THAN OTHERS

Magistrate Finds Extenuating Circumstances—Barrister Levesconte is Reported, Too.

When Christopher Holland stood up in the police court to receive his sentence for stealing \$12,800 from the Ideal Bedding Company, Magistrate Denison said, before passing a sentence of three months in the Central on Holland: "The lightness of the sentence is due, not to the character of the crime, but the extraordinary and unprofessional conduct of the conduct of R. G. Levesconte, solicitor for the Bedding Company, in connection with this case. This was done at the request of Magistrate Denison, who severely criticized Levesconte a few days ago."

The magistrate ordered that Holland's personal effects be turned over to Mrs. Holland, remarking that if the Bedding Company wished to gain possession of them they could enter an action to recover them.

As soon as Holland's term expires he will return to England to fight for the £500 which Levesconte succeeded in tying up, as the Hollands claim, by false promises.

The sentence imposed on Holland meets with the general approval of the public.

BEFORE THE GRAND JURY.

Insurance scandals in New York will be thoroughly probed.

IS IN HAMILTON TO-DAY

List of Cases Which Will Come Before the Board—Some Vexed Questions.

The board of railway commissioners for Canada sit in Hamilton this morning at the city hall and will hear the following cases:

Application of the T. H. and B. R. Co. for leave to carry its line of railway across Garth-street, Hamilton, at grade.

Application of the G.T.R. for approval of proposed connection or junction at Hamilton between the northern division of the Grand Trunk (16th district) and the main line of the G.T.R. (17th district), between Niagara Falls and Hamilton, and authorizing the railway company to construct, maintain and operate said connection or junction.

Application of the City of Hamilton for leave to construct a highway across the main line of the G.T.R. on Ferguson-avenue, Hamilton, at grade.

Application of the City of Hamilton to construct a footbridge across the main line of the G.T.R. at height of not less than 22 feet 6 inches above rail level, the cost of such footbridge to be paid by the company and the corporation, respectively, in such proportions as the board may order.

Application of the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Railway Co. for leave to cross certain highways in Thorold and in the Township of Thorold with its line of railway.

Application of E. Brennan of Hamilton for an order directing the G.T.R. to compensate him for damages sustained by his lands in Hamilton.

Application of E. C. Patriarche and the Burlington Canning Co. of Burlington for an order directing the G.T.R. to provide proper facilities for re-t. R. to providing and delivering traffic offered for carriage in and out and to and from said Patriarche and the Burlington Canning Co. by means of the Hamilton Radial Electric Railway.

Application of the Corporation of Hamilton for protection at a crossing of Wellington-street crossings, where they are crossed by the tracks of the G.T.R. Co.

Application of the Corporation of St. Catharines for an order directing the G.T.R.
