### NEW YORK WON AMATEUR CUP FOUR FAVORITES IN FRONT

Jockey Miller Caught the Judges'  
Eye for Three Wins—Closing  
Day at Benning.

Washington, Nov. 30.—The feature at  
the Benning racetrack to-day was the  
amateur cup, a high weight selling race.  
New York, the favorite, won handily.  
He was admirably ridden by Mr.  
Wright. Quadrille, which had many  
supporters, went out in front as the  
barrier rose, but he had shot his bolt  
by the time the stretch was reached.

money, being beaten out of the place by
