WALL STREET FINANCIER DELIRIOUS, ENDS LIFE

Howard Frothingham, Prominent in "Call Money" Circles, Jumps From Window.

New York, Feb. 2.—Howard P. Frothingham, who, while delirious from nervous breakdown, jumped from the second storey of his home, No. 29 West Seventy-seventh-street yesterday, died just before last midnight. The death was not reported to the police until today, when the coroner instituted an investigation.

Strain due to recent reverses in Wall-street is believed to have caused the despondency which resulted in suicide. He was one of the best known men in the financial district. He has passed his 45th birthday and was a native of New York City.

He was probably the best known loan broker in the country, for he lent more than \$1,000,000 a year. He was for sixteen years a member of the New York Stock Exchange, but he found lending more profitable than brokerage, and devoted his time almost entirely to it.

Despite his large income Mr. Frothingham was not regarded as a very wealthy man. His charities were very large, and only recently he said that he was by no means as rich as many supposed. He added that his entire fortune would not foot up to more than \$300,000.

Old Actor's Death. New York, Feb. 3.—George W. Denham, 81 years of age, an old-time actor, died of apoplexy on the street to-day, while on his way to see his physician. Mr. Denham for many years supported Joseph Jefferson and has appeared with a number of other stars. He was prominent in Masonic circles.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

M'INTOSH, A DETECTIVE POLICEMAN HIS VICTIMS

More Facts Come to Light—A Brakeman Killed—Robert Stuart Dead.

Hamilton, Feb. 3.—(Special).—The police have made a new discovery concerning A. K. M. McIntosh, the man in the private detective business, belonging to the Weaver Agency. Amongst his alleged victims are two members of the local police force, Constables Thompson and Edmerson.

Charles Alvin, 176 West Hunter-street, a brakeman employed by the Hamilton Street & Iron Company, fell off a car this morning under the wheels and was instantly killed. Coroner McIntosh has opened an inquest.

A fatal car jumped the tracks at the corner of Gore and Mary-streets this morning, and ran up on the boulevard. All the passengers received a bad shaking. A driver broke into H. O. & A. B. Mackay's automobile last night and got a case of whiskey.

Robert Stuart, 86 years of age, who has lived in Hamilton since 1832, died last night at the residence of his son-in-law, A. L. Lee. The following family survive him: R. M. Stuart, Hamilton, and A. Boston, and Mrs. Lee and Mrs. W. L. Simpson, Hamilton.

John McLachlan, a retired baker, 26 Eighth-street, died to-day.

Beverly Smith, a Southcot farmer, fell from a load of hay Saturday, and, after picking himself up, went on his way as if nothing had happened. He spent the night at the Big Four Hotel, and when he got up in the morning acted very strangely. He was taken to the City Hospital, where the doctors found he was suffering from concussion of the brain. His chances of recovery are not bright.

Ready to Build. The promoters of the Hamilton and Guelph Junction say the C. P. R. is ready to start the construction of the line at once, and have it operating this summer. The condition of Hon. J. S. Hendrie is reported to be improved. There is a report in circulation that efforts will be made to obtain the release of Hillhouse Brown on the ground that his mind has become affected.

Official notice of the appointment of E. A. McKeay as license commissioner has been received. The lieutenant-governor will visit the city early in June at the request of the Citizens Club.

The Trades and Labor Council has passed a resolution protesting against the suggestion of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board that a new agreement be made with the Cataract Power Company.

John T. Hall has been requested to assume his new duties at Medicine Hat on March 3. John H. McLean is an applicant for the position. Aid Macleod is being urged to take the job.
