PHYSICIANS ARRESTED.
They Are Charged With Giving Pills to Cause Palpitation.

Cologne, May 26.—Two physicians were arrested here to-day on charges of assisting men to escape conscription into the army by administering pills to them which caused palpitation of the heart. Four of the men who took the pills died from their effects. Suspicion was aroused and an investigation was begun.

New York, May 26.—The second night's play in the four-handed professional billiard match at three-cushion croquet resulted to-night in a victory for Wizard Schaefer and W. D. Harrison of Chicago, who scored 65 points against 55 for Napoleon Frank Ives and John A. Thatcher. This gave them the match, their total score being 125 to 109 for the other team.

Harrison was the star of to-night's game, and his individual score showed 39 points, against 33 for Ives, 20 for Schaefer and 22 for Thatcher.

STRIKE OF THE TRACKMEN.

Officials at Montreal Say They Are Filling the Places of the Men Who Went Out.

STRIKERS SAY THEY WILL WIN

Much Speculation as to What the Locomotive Engineers Intend to Do.

The striking Grand Trunk trackmen are growing more confident of victory each day. It was the opinion of several members yesterday that to-night will see the end of the trouble, and that end will be arbitration of the grievance. Every arrangement has been made for the mass-meeting this afternoon. Owing to the large number who will attend the meeting, the Grand Trunk has decided to hold it in Occident Hall, Queen and Bataurstreets. Word was received that a large delegation of men from the Grand Trunk and many will also come from East Toronto and other neighboring places. Speeches will be delivered by A. H. Brown, Mr. David Carey of the Trades and Labor Council.

With the Strikers Yesterday.
The men met yesterday at Mr. Thomas Lurie's house, 20 Tecumseh-street, and passed the time reading the papers and playing games. During the day the following telegram was received from Grand Organizer A. B. Brown, who is in Montreal with the Executive Committee:

Not one man weakened nor replaced. All struck true.

Pickets on Duty.
Pickets have been placed along the road in Toronto and Montreal to make their places. INSURANCE LOSSES AT ST. JOHN.
Figures at Present in Show a Total of \$217,225 and More is Expected.

St. John, N. B., May 26.—About 240 buildings, including stores, dwellings, barns, houses, etc., were burned in yesterday's fire, and three hundred families are homeless. The list of companies and approximate losses is as follows:
