

Toronto Junction, July 14.-About 4 o'clock this afternoon, Mrs. Julia Just, wife of Nicholas Just of East Dundasstreet, entered Stoddart's drug store, at the corner of Dundas and Medlandstreets, and asked for something to relieve her, as she could scarcely breathe. Mr. Stoddart at once saw that something serious was the matter. Mrs. Just walked to a small room in the rear and lay down and almost immediately expired. Ten minutes from the time she entered the store life was extinct. Coroner Dr. Clendenan was notified, but as death was undoubtedly dut to natural causes an inquest was not deemed necessary. The body was brought to Scruton's undertaking brought to Scruton's undertaking rooms. Mr. Just, who is a machinist and works at Petrie's, in the city, was away at the time, and did not learn of the sad occurrence until he arrived home at 7 p.m., when Deputy Chief of Police Flintoff broke the news to him.

Mrs. Just was 30 years of age, was married to Mr. Just only eight months ago, and the latter has been almost completely prostrated by the shock. She appeared to be quite well this morning when her husband went to his work in the city.
