

Steps Taken to Suppress Sunday Newspapers in London.

Clara Ward in Egypt-Canadian Products in Demand-American Failure in the Philippines Predicted.

Dublin, Ireland, March 27.-The most serious attempt to reunite the Irish Nationalist members of parliament since the Parnell split will be made in the city hall here April 4. A conference, to which all the Nationalist members of parliament of all sections are invited, will assemble that day with the object of arriving at a basis of unity and common action for the future in and out of parliament. This conference is the result of the energetic measures taken by the Limerick and renegades to fight their own mocorporation, to ascertain the feeling of the other public bodies throughout Ireland having Nationalist majorities on the subject of reunion and a cessation of internecine strife. Mr. Dillon and the majority of those who act with him immediately accepted the invitation to the conference. Mr. Healy and several of his colleagues also signified their intention to be present, but John Redmond has not yet replied. Unfortunately there had been a hitch in connection with a proposition made by Redmond which may balk the whole effort at unity. Early in March he sent to Sir Thomas Esmonde—the acting chairman of the Irish since Dillon resigned-a resolution adopted by his followers proposing that before the Dublin meeting there should be a preliminary conference in London of all the Irish Nationalist members to decide if possible upon a scheme of agreement to be submitted to the Dublin conference. But Esmonde fell ill of influenza, has been laid up a month, and as no one was empowered to act in his stead he fixed the meeting of the Irish party to consider Redmond's proposal for Tuesday, March 28, the day parliament adjourns for the Easter recess. Healy in his paper accused Dillon, Blake, Davitt and T. P. PALM SUNDAY

Customs That Mark the Beginning of Holy Week.

Yesterday was Palm Sunday, and the services at St. Peter's Cathedral were largely attended. Piles of palm stalks were laid upon the altar, and after being blessed, distributed to the congre-

Upwards of eighteen centuries have passed since one of humble birth was so honored by his fellow-men that he was attended by thousands on his triumphal entry into Jerusalem, and it has not yet been forgotten that the this incident been suggested in the celebration of one of the days of the Lenten season, the Sunday before Easter, which has come to bear the name of Palm Sunday. In Europe it is customary to distribute in churches on Palm Sunday branches of box, yew or willow, in places where palm would be difficult to obtain, and these are then carried in procession in memory of the triumphal entry of Jesus. Of old it was usual to return the branches to the church and then burn them. The remains were kept until Ash Wednesday, when they were sprinkled on the heads of the congregation, with the blessings of the admin-

istrants. The spirit that pervades the services of Palm Sunday is one of mingled sadness and joy. The remembrance of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the magnificence of Jesus' reception by the people brings gladness with it, but through this gladness is seen the sorrow that marked the events soon following. In all of the Catholic churches the ceremony of blessing the palms is performed, the celebrant giving the first palm branch to the highest dignitary present, the next to the deacon, then the sub-deacon, the acolytes, and finally to the people through the ush ers. The palm branch consists of a strip of palm leaf, and each one, when receiving it from the hands of the celebrant, kisses his hand and the branch. This ceremony is followed by a procession of the officers and clergy through the church. Then comes the singing of the Passion of Christ, with music especially arranged for it. This is in three parts, one representing Christ, another the turba or crowd, and the third being taken by the narrator. When the narrator comes to a part which represents Christ speaking, he lowers his voice; when the crowd is to take up the theme, the voice of the narrator is raised. So are the cues given. The members of the congregation carry the palm branches home with them.
