On leaving the university he en ered newspaper work as a reporter e the Toronto newspapers, and among the important assignments covered two ses sions in the press gallery of the Hou of Commons at Ottawa; in the la courts at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, Lat he entered provincial journalism, and for ten years owned and edited newspapers in Port Hope and Cobourg. He came west in 1901 as secretary to Pre-mier Haultain, and a year later starte
