BANDITS HOLD CROWD PASSENGER TRAFFIC BACK WHILE JEWELRY HEAVY ON ALL ROADS WINDOW IS ROBBED

Trio of Daring Crooks Carry Railroads Report Record Busi-Out Well-Planned Scheme.

ALL MAKE ESCAPE

New York Treated to Most Sensational Robbery in Weeks.

New York, March 12.-While Broadway tonight was crowded with theatregoers, three armed bandits smashed in the window of a jewelry store at Thirty-seventh street, kept the crowds at bay with their revolvers until they had emptied the contents of several trays into their pockets, and then escaped, shooting one pedestrian who A few minutes later three men en-tered another Broadway jewelry store a few blocks up-town, and after throw-ing pepper in a clerk's eyes, grabbed

One Pedestrian Shot.

In addition to the pedestrian who was shot, but not seriously injured, one other member of the crowd succeeded in getting his fingers on a fugitive. He was rewarded by a crack on the wrist from a revolver butt which caused his arm to fall helplessly to his side.

Proprietors of the two stores estimated that thousands of dollars worth of jewelry had been stolen.

The first robbery, in which Schwartz Bros. were the victims, was engineered with great daring. While rubbing elbows with passing pedestrians, one of the bandits slipped an iron bar through the handles of the door, so it could not be opened from the inside. Then a brick wrapped in cloth was hurled through the window.

At the fingle of falling glass, Frank Schwartz ran excitedly to the door and tried to pull it open as he shouted for tried to pull it open as he shouted for help. The crowd, also attracted by the crash, swarmed about the robbers, two of whom continued coolly at their task of raking diamonds and rubies out of the window.

Cannot Believe That America Unions Involved Claim Mem-Would Desert At This Time.

WOULD BE CALAMITY

Ex-Premier of Britain Speaks On the League of Nations.

London, March 13.—Herbert H. Asquith, former premier, in a speech last night dealing with the League of Nations, said that as long as the United States did not share in the league it must have a fragmentary and lopsided aspect. As far as he was able to judge, Mr. Asquith added a yast majority of the strike call. Judge Beaten Up In Mistake By a Chicago Cop

Windy City Jurist Gets Worst Of It in Role of Peacemaker.

Chicago, March 13.—An attempt at peacemaking by Chief Justice Harry Olson of the municipal court during a fight in a darkened corridor of the city hall last night resulted in a bruised eye for the jurist and his threat to swea out a warrant for the arrest of a police sergeant, who, the judge said, choked him, while his original assailants fled. Judge Olson was leaving the city hall for the night, when he came upon four men fighting in the corridor. A fifth lay on the floor, bruised and bleeding. The judge appealed to the men to cease fighting, whereupon one of the four knocked him down. The judge defended himself, at the same time shouting for

At this point Police Sergeant Philip Carroll intervened. When peace was restored Judge Olson said Carroll, instead of assisting him. had seized him about the neck and choked him, while permitting his assailants to get away. Carroll denied this, asserting that he mistook the judge for one of the assailants.

PAN-GERMAN CLIQUE

Paris, March 13.—The names associated with the new revolutionary movement in Germany indicate its reactionary character. The Dr. von Kapp reported as having assumed the chancellorship, it seems probable, is Dr. Wolf Gang Kapp, a former Conservative member of the Reichstag and general-director of the German Agricultural Society. He was one of the deputies who sarly in 1918 urged the Government to speed up the U-boat building program. He became president of the German fatherland party, the notorious pan-German organization which urged that Germany carry on the war to the bitter end. After the abdication of Emperor William and the signing of the armistice, Dr. Kapp was one of the men for whose arrest the Independent Socialists clamored on the ground that he and his associates had been responsible for the continuation of the war and the hindering of peace.

Maj.-Gen. Baron von Luettwitz, who, according to the dispatches has been named commander-in-chief, was military governor of Belgium for a period in the early days of the war. VON KAPP IN CONTROL.

Paris, March 13 .- A proclamation issued in Berlin today declares that the Government of the Empire has ceased to exist and that the power of the state has passed into the hands of General-Director von Kapp, who becomes chancellor, and has appointed Gen, von Luettwitz commander-in-chief of the military forces, Berlin dispatches state.

The proclamation declares the National Assembly dissolved. It is announced that a new government is being formed. The Socialist parties have declared a general strike, the dis-
