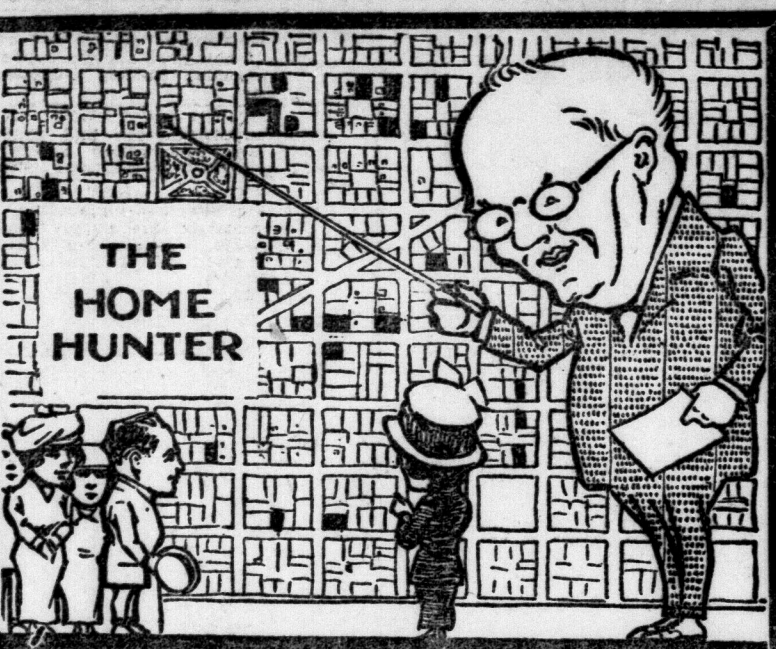

MOSCOW NOTIFIES MARTENS TO RETURN TO RUSSIA AT ONCE

Tchitcherin instructs Ambassador to Cancel All Orders.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, Russian Soviet "ambassador" to the United States, today notified the department of labor that upon instructions from the Moscow Government just received by cable, he will surrender himself for deportation January 3.

The cable from Moscow was a reply to Martens' report of his deportation order, and was sent by George Tchitcherin, Soviet minister of foreign affairs, who denounced the present United States administration for its "hostility."

"We must resign ourselves to the fact that Russia for the time being, due to the hostile attitude of the present American administration, will have to get along without its co-operation," the message said. "You are instructed to return to Russia without delay, together with the Russian citizens who are members of your staff, and to cancel and liquidate, in accordance with instructions you will receive from the commissariat of foreign trade, all orders placed with American firms."

THOUSANDS NOT ON WINDSOR VOTERS' LIST

Own Property, But Are Not Citizens, According To Law.

WINDSOR, Dec. 27.—Replying to statements made by Ald. England that 46 per cent of the parents of children attending the public schools are not on the voters' list, Alexander Black, city assessor, said the law absolutely forbids the placing of these people upon the list.

Mr. Black said that 5,000 people living in the city, whose children attend the public schools, are not British subjects. He quoted from the voters act, which specifies that only citizens shall exercise the franchise.

On account of Windsor being a border city there are thousands of Americans owning property in the city, and as a result taking an active part in local affairs. It was in the interests of these people that Ald. England sought a revision of the list.

The fact that they own property and have children in the schools does not give them the right to the franchise, according to Mr. Black. They must suffer the same deprivation as Canadians on the American side, unless the Ottawa Government sees fit to change the nationalization laws, the assessor said.

LEFT THE FARMS

Agricultural Immigrants May Be Sent Back by the Government.

CHATHAM, Dec. 27.—The local chamber of commerce will take up with the Government the return of agricultural immigrants to the land. It has been brought to the notice of the local chamber that a number of these men came to Kent county to work on the farms, but after a few weeks with the "cows and chickens," hiked to the city and obtained employment in factories. As they were brought to this country for agricultural work only, an effort will be made to make them return to the farms.
