## NOTE AND COMMENT

The University of Virginia boys gave the champion Toronto a nice work-out yesterday at Charlottesville. As our special despatch says it was not necessary for the champions to extend themselves to win by 9 to 3. The students showed the usual weakness of college teams, viz., an inability to bat, and a characteristic accuracy in fielding. The Toronto showed lack of training in the field, the university team's three runs being scored on bad throws.

It is not generally known, but nevertheless it is a fact that Ed. Barrow introduced Hans Wagner to real baseball. After playing around Ohio and Pennsylvania, the Toronto man landed him for his Patterson Atlantic League team in 1896, and the Patterson only finished second. Wagner was in uniform the next year, Louisville landed him in a struggle with Pittsburgh, the latter club securing the great player when Barney Dreyfus bought up the Pittsburgh stock.

The idea promulgated at the last meeting of the board of governors of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, viz., that only sporting goods of Canadian manufacture be used by affiliated clubs, was adopted at a meeting yesterday of the committee in charge of the Olympic tournament April 9, 10 and 11, in the St. Lawrence Arena, and no weights, hurdles, shots, poles, etc., of foreign production will be allowed.

The few Canadians at Washington are doing quite well. Johnny Flynn's Blitzen fly goes fast, repeated again yesterday, beating the favorite, Woodley. In the second race W. H. Morley Arabia ran second to Court Lady in the two-year-old filly event, with good place odds against her. Jockey McCarthy again evidently furnishing a good finish. Arabia is by Hansome, out of Creole.

Look for King's Platers in a few years from the neighborhood of St. Thomas, as the royally-bred, imported stallion Crickadee, years old, by Ladas, has just been purchased by Thomas Donley of that city from T. A. Crow for \$1200. Crickadee was brought out from England by Mr. Seagram as a three-year-old.

Wise horsemen from across the line say that the passage of the new Albany amendment by the assembly will not mean that it is to become law. They seem to count on the bill being thrown out by the senate next Wednesday.

Toronto Beat the Students  
Without Much Effort, 0 to 3

Pearson, Cockman and Mertes  
Mentioned in Despatch—Com-  
plain of Hot Weather—Play in  
Lynchburg To-Day.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, March 27.—(Special.)—The University of Virginia ball team, one of the crack college nines of the south, proved easy victims to-day for the Toronto team, Eastern League champions, who won by 3 to 0. The weather was so hot it made the players languid, and the Toronto did not have to try very hard at any stage. Pearson caught splendidly, and Mertes and Cockman showed good form.

The Toronto scored their nine runs as follows:

One in the first—Schlafly hit by pitcher and went to second on wild pitch. Mertes base on balls, double-steal by Schlafly and Mertes. Schlafly scored on Flyer's error, short to first.

One in the third—Schlafly base on balls. To-day's first, Mertes fouled out. Cockman out, short to first.

One in the fifth—Pearson singled to centre. Kilroy, base on balls. Schlafly hit by pitcher. Mertes fouled out. Flyer hit safely to second, scoring Pearson. Wottell sacrificed long fly to centre. Kilroy scored. Cockman hit to third base, scoring Pearson. Flyer hit to short, and Wottell out to centre.

Three in the sixth—Rudolph hit safely over second and stole. Pearson out, fly to Hornaker. Rudolph went to third on passed ball. Kilroy hit by pitcher and stole second. Schlafly safe on Hoff's error. Wottell scoring. Mertes sacrificed with fly ball to short. Kilroy scoring.

Out in the seventh—Schlafly hit by pitcher. Flyer hit to short, and Wottell out to centre. Finally one in the seventh—Cockman hit for two bases and scored on Frick's two-bagger. Rudolph struck out; so did Pearson. Connolly walked. Schlafly struck out.

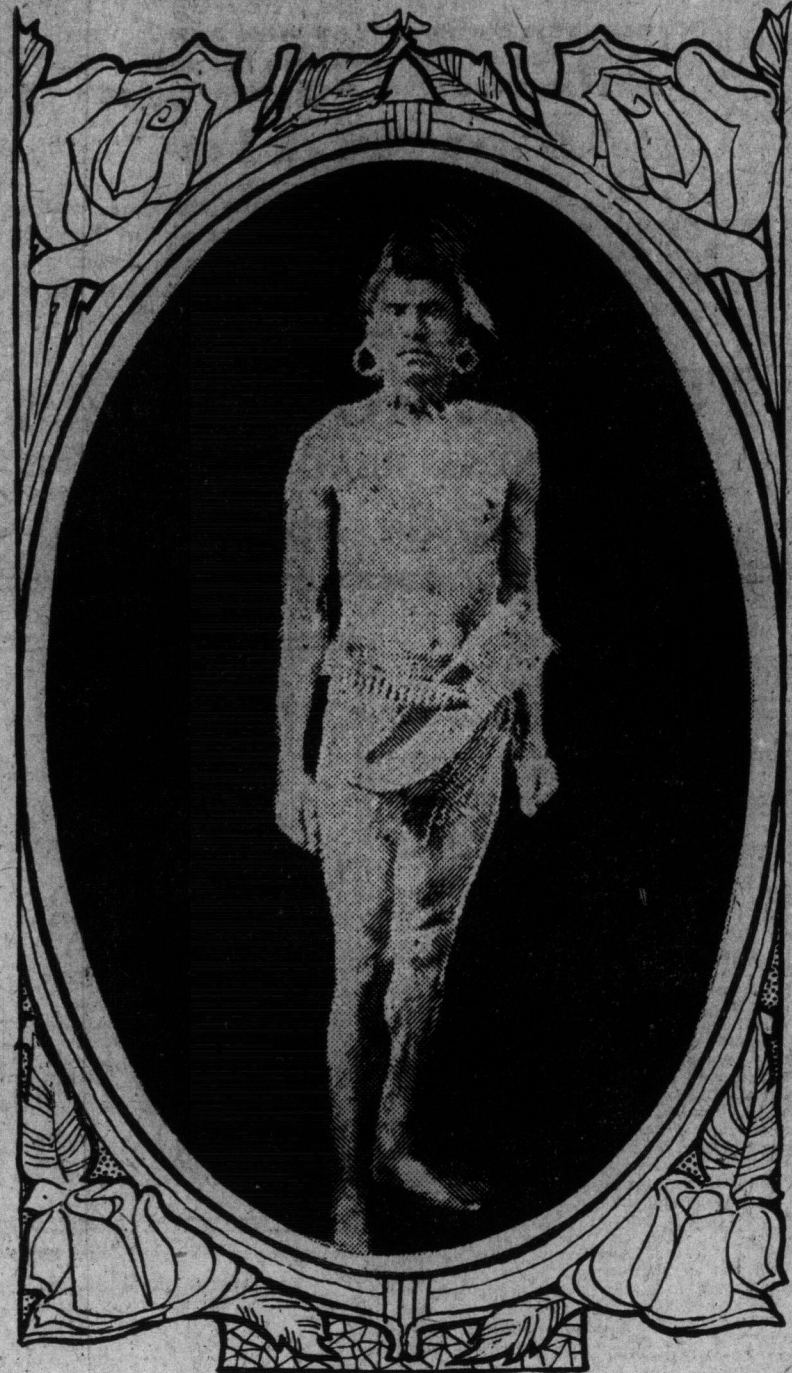
