Hundreds of friends of deceased passed in and out of the house in a constant procession to pay their last tributes. Prominent was Frank C. Roundy, Chicago, the Imperial potentate of the order of the Mystic Shrine, came to do honor to the only Canadian who had ever preceded him in office.

A private service was held in the house by Rev. A. J. Broughall, St. Stephens, Rev. Mr. Reid, and Rev. Alex. Macgillivray. After this Doric Lodge of the Masonic Order took charge of the proceedings, under W. Master, W. J. Bilger, The Doric Lodge Quartet supplied appropriate music.

Threatening drops fell and the thunder rolled as the assistants began to carry out the lavishly and beautifully furnished casket, which was followed by the steel reinforced cement vault with flowers.

The honorary pall-bearers were Imperial Potentate F. C. Roundy, Chicago, Potentate J. F. Giamville, Ramesses Temple, Potentate A. L. Davis, Memphis Temple, London, A. E. Cooper, Past Potentate, Saitana Temple, London.

CROWDED IN AISLES OF A GRAND TRUNK TRAIN

Suburban Traffic Large Despite Lack of Accommodation—Better Service Imperative.

PICKERING, June 23.—(Special).—The people of Pickering and surrounding country are watching with the keenest interest The World's advocacy of a general suburban service for Toronto.

They are particularly anxious to learn all about the success of the C. P. R. experiment to Brampton. Remarks are freely heard on all sides that the presence of such an enterprising experiment on the Grand Trunk lines would result in a volume of traffic entirely unequaled by the C. P. R. suburban service.

There are plenty of people living here who would like to take the city trip often, but who stay at home because of the high rates and poor time-table.

Need Better Service. Only three trains stop here each way daily, and the C. P. R. station handles more freight and express business than many larger towns, the passenger traffic is decidedly on the back shelf as far as accommodation goes.

This morning the regular up train was crowded and there was no place for ladies to go but into the second-class. These are objectionable in a good many ways, and the ladies who stand crowded to the back of the train were not very complimentary in their remarks about the Grand Trunk.

People in the country are singularly alive to the suburban possibilities and are pleased to hear of the success of the C. P. R. suburban car service on the Brampton run.

Now that the street railway has stopped at Highway Creek and the C. P. R.'s new line has been postponed for a time, it looks as if the present facilities, bad as they are, will obtain some time longer. Such a thing in this prosperous district, right on the main line of traffic and within 25 miles of Toronto, as having such an inadequate service, ought to make the Grand Trunk bestir themselves to grant commuted rates, give better daily trains, or start the motor suburban, if only in the name of progress.

The World has the people of Pickering behind it in its demand for popular reforms such as this.

WORK FOR THEODORE JR.

President's Son to Be Employed by United States Steel Corporation.

NEW YORK, June 23.—Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., it is understood, will have his first experience of actual work in the summer of 1908, when he will get that experience as an employee of the United States Steel Corporation. Young Mr. Roosevelt, who is a member of the junior class at Harvard, in the academic department, visited the one holdings of the steel corporation last year.

John C. Greenway, who was in the Rough Riders, as the president holds a hearty friendship, is the superintendent of the Western Mesquite department of the steel corporation's ore properties, and it is under his direction, it is said, that the younger Roosevelt will be employed.

BLENNHEIM HOTEL BURNED.

Buzzard House is Badly Damaged by Fire.

BLENNHEIM, June 23.—(Special).—The Buzzard House was badly damaged by fire this morning, which started in the kitchen.

The guests were awakened from their slumbers by the clanging of fire bells. A bucket brigade was formed and kept the fire partly under control until the department arrived, which was rather late. The house has been erected for fifty years, and this is the first time that it has been on fire.

RECOUNT IS APPEALED.

Conservatives of Stormont May Overthrow McCort.

CORNWALL, June 23.—An appeal has been entered against the action of County Judge O'Reilly in the Stormont recount. Judge O'Reilly allowed the ballots in the polls at Moulinette and Aultville, where the deputy returning officers neglected to remove the numbered stubs attached to the ballot.

The two polls gave a majority of 44 for Liberal candidate McCort, and if they are thrown out Mr. Milligan (Conservative) will be elected.

Rich Vein Discovered.

A rich vein was discovered at the LaRosa yesterday. On the thirty-five foot level on an intermediate drift, one hundred feet south of the main shaft a vein running twenty inches wide in places was tapped and carries five thousand ounces of silver to the ton.

The steamer Arundel, on Pineview Shoal, Lake Ontario, has been abandoned. The loss is \$25,000.
