TRANSILVANIA TROOPS REVOLT AND BLOODS SHED

Garrison at Constantinople Surround Parliament and Demand Dismissal of Ministers—Cabinet Resign and Mutineers Pardoned.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 12.—The troops of the garrison revolted before the parliament building against the committee of union and progress and the government.

The latter, who are chiefly artillerymen and cavalry, are massed at the war ministry.

The cabinet met at the Porte early in the morning and after a long consultation to the palace.

The latest rumor is that Tefik Pasha, who was recently appointed ambassador to Great Britain, will be the new grand vizier.

The Sultan's principal secretary read to the chamber an order announcing that His Majesty had accepted the cabinet's resignation and that a new ministry was in process of formation.

At dawn the Kurds, led by a corporal and Kurt Hodja, a member of the Mohammedan Union, seized the parliament house and the telegraph offices.

Violent demonstrations both inside parliament and in the streets followed the killing of the editor.

No Statement From Pugsley To Parliament

Because His Conduct in Regard To Government Matters Is Not Questioned—Will Publish a Defence.

OTTAWA, April 12.—(Special)—Dr. Pugsley will not, after all, make a statement in the federal parliament in reply to the report of the New Brunswick commission.

"I have concluded that as a report of the commission does not in any way reflect on my conduct as a member of the federal parliament, or as a member of the Dominion Government, it would not be appropriate for me to introduce the subject here."

MAN IS FATALLY KICKED LEFT ON STREET TO DIE

ENGLISH TRAVELER'S ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE

C. W. Leech, Who Registered at Hotel Yesterday Morning, Shoots Himself in Rosedale.

Placing a Colt's revolver in his mouth and firing with the evident intention of ending his life, C. W. Leech, an English commercial traveler, shot himself yesterday afternoon after seeking a lonely spot in the Rosedale Ravine at the eastern end of South Drive.

DANGER OVER ON NIAGARA

Full Extent of the Damage Not Yet Apparent.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., April 12.—Unless there is a rush of ice from Lake Erie, which will pile up on the ice now anchored in the lower gorge, all danger from further damage to marine and rail shipping between the whirpool and the mouth of the river is past.

URGENT PROTECTION FOR THE WOOL INDUSTRY

Y., April 12.—Declaring that the section of the Liquor Tax Law prohibiting saloons from opening on Sunday cannot be enforced in New York City by local officials, because of the influence to which these men are subjected, District Attorney Wm. T. Jerome of New York appeared today before the senate committee on taxation and retrenchment in favor of the bill of Senator Brough, which would permit saloons to open on Sunday in first-class cities, from 1-10 p.m.
