SUBMARINES ESCAPED BY ITALIAN STEAMERS

Not One Loss Reported During Week Ended May Twentieth.

Rome, Via Paris, May 24.—No Italian steamers were sunk by submarines during the week ending May 20. One was attacked by gunfire and sustained some damage. Only two sailing ships, both under way, were lost during the same period.

During the week 46 ships, representing a tonnage of 475,000 tons, entered Italian ports, and 37, representing 413,000 tons left.

During the week ending May 13 two Italian steamers under 1,200 tons each, and seven small sailing craft were sunk. Some fishing boats were also lost.
