Canon Cody Tells Women All Must Fight and Endure Same.

WILL BRIDGE GULF

Canadian Army Should Include Eastern Province, Says This Speaker.

Women of the various battalions of the city met yesterday in the Y. W. C. A. Hall, McGill street, in answer to the invitation that had been extended thru the press. In her introductory remarks the chairman said: "We are here to help, one another to a sense of a responsibility which we are now using for the first time. When we mark our ballot we either send help at once or delay our decision to see if help will be sent later." Mrs. Cooper illustrated the present situation by the simile of a house on fire. The spectators asked themselves: "Shall we call out the fire department or shall we delay until we see the neighbors is it the right thing to do?" She noticed the audience that the time for action had been extended until midnight and that there were women present who would be glad to help them in doing so.

At this point a number of returned soldiers sang and gave hearty welcome the audience rising to their feet and remaining standing until the men had taken their places.

"I have never been in the habit of taking active part in the politics of the Dominion," were the opening words of Archdeacon Cody, who gave the principal address of the afternoon. "I have always felt that a clergyman should confine himself to broad principles and leave the rest to the people. In this occasion I have felt that every citizen should speak and act. The issues today are greater than any party issue, greater than politics, for there will never be a greater issue than that of the 17th."

"Fellow citizens who enjoy the vote for the first time," said the speaker, "the boys who have gone to fight for the country and for you and you are going to use your vote with a profound sense of its responsibility. On the issue of the next election depends the issue of the grace of honor, defeat or victory, shrink or continuing to do our duty."

If we want a united Canada the best thing is to make all fight and endure the same dangers for the same great end. For Quebec there is no better medicine than to give them a big dose of Canadianism. Let us give them the lantern-like gift which would include the Military Service Act. 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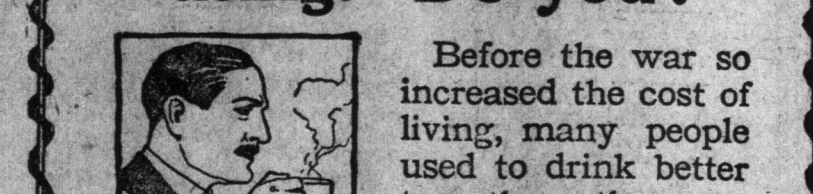
