BEST RACING SEASON. New York, Oct. 30.—The racing season which closed this afternoon was the best ever held on courses under the juris-diction of the Jockey Club. There was a total of 144 racing days at the courses and there was distributed the total of 14.69,407.26. The season was notable for the ap-pearance of the "wonder horse." Man of War, and his presence on the track do a great deal to put the thorobred or a pinnacle. This colt was so much su-perior to the others of his own age that he dwarfed what would have been con-sidered fine specimens in other seasons. Outside of half a dozen fairly good colls for and fillies, the two-year-old collection was not notable. Inchcape looked a good colt, but had no chance to show it in the best company. Tryster was the juvenile which impressed the best of the critics as a sterling youngster, and if he grows during the winter, he will be hard to beat next year. He has the right sort of a citeposition for a first-class race.
