Counterfeit Bills.
Local banks have been warned to look out for the counterfeit of the new issue of \$10 Farmers' Bank notes. Several are in circulation, and several banks in other cities have been taken in by the bill. The forgery is said to be rather a clumsy one, and quite easy to be detected. The description of the bill is as follows: "Check letter A; treasury number 12,073 in red, dated Jan. 2, 1907; W. Seelie Nesbitt, president; countersigned T. H. Wells, general manager. Looks like a photo engraving of pen and ink sketch. Lathe work on front poorly imitated. All the lettering very irregular. Vignette coarse and blurred. Lathe work on back scratchy. Lettering 'The Farmers' Bank of Canada,' poor. Imprint of British-American Bank Note Company, Ottawa, is very indistinct." The bills should be especially easy of detection on account of the fact that the highest number of \$10 Farmers' Bank bills is 3,750 while the counterfeits are numbered over 12,000.

Some Waterworks Figures.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

In your report of the water commission meeting of Tuesday, you furnish some very interesting data. From the engineer's record for April the average daily pumping shows that for every man, woman and child that go to make up Mr. Grant's population of 47,000 for the city of London, 83 gallons of water have been consumed. As practically every factory of any consequence in this city now has its own private supply, and as we know the fire department and the streets required but very little during April, it is fair to assume that nearly all of April pumping has gone for domestic use. That is, each baby or adult has got away with two 40 gallon barrels of city water every day. Yet we feel quite certain had the actual usage been measured not one-quarter of this amount has actually been used.

Who then has consumed the big fraction of the other three-quarters?

Again, if that amount were pumped during all the months of the current year and sold to those who buy water at 10 cents for each 1,000 gallons, the city would receive \$143,335.50, and every citizen would have had cheap water.

This is the only method in existence that will give the consumer cheap water—that is by measure. All other methods make water dear. Faithfully yours,
