condition. It would be of no use, however, to do the work and charge it to the street railway, as the company would not pay for it.

The only rent the company paid for the park was to keep the grounds clean, and it was seeking to get out of paying that. He thought that Superintendent Graydon would write Mayor King a stiff letter on the subject, and insist that he do better in the future. He suggested that six boxes be made, as proposed by Mr. Pearce, as an experiment.

This was agreed to by the board.

New Hydrants.

City Engineer Graydon wrote suggesting that five new hydrants be installed on Victoria Hospital grounds to protect the Isolation Hospital and Hygienic Institute.

Engineer Moore reported that the hydrants were necessary, but the matter was laid over until the next meeting.

THE MURDERED ACTOR

Victim of Brutal Assault in New York Was a Torontonian.

Toronto, June 15.—The actor of the "Road to Yesterday" company, who was held up and beaten to death by highwaymen on West Twenty-seventh street, New York, on Friday, and whose name was given as Albert Grosby, was rightly Albert G. Nowell, a son of Mrs. H. Nowell, of this city. In the unfortunate man's pocket was found a letter reading:

"In case of accident, notify my mother, 136 Morse street, Toronto." It was by means of this that his identity was ascertained.

The description given of the dead man coincided with that of Nowell. William Nowell, a brother, left for New York Friday night to see and take charge of the body.

The word of his dear mother was the first that his mother had heard of him for some time, as the young man had not been in very close touch with his home.

LAST PUBLIC APPEARANCE

Archbishop O'Connor Confirms Large Class of Children.

Toronto, June 15.—Archbishop O'Connor made his farewell public appearance yesterday afternoon, when his grace confirmed 50 girls, 41 boys, and a number of adults in St. Patrick's Church.

A peculiar significance attached to the service owing to it being generally known that it would be the last one at which Archbishop O'Connor would officiate, and his words of admonition to the newly confirmed seemed to be more than usually impressive because of this fact. However, reference to it was made by his grace.

The church was packed and many persons stood throughout the service.

Following the confirmation, in which the Archbishop was assisted by Rev. Father Murray and Rev. Father Brick, rector of St. Patrick's Church, the boys, with uplifted right hand, promised not to touch intoxicating drink until 21 years of age. His grace advised both boys and girls not to join any society without first consulting their priest, and not to take part in religious exercises in any other church than a Catholic church. The service concluded with the Holy Sacrament.

Archbishop McEvoy, who succeeds Archbishop O'Connor in the high office which the latter has voluntarily relinquished, will be installed on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock in St. Michael's Cathedral.

TRACY GETS OUT OF SARNIA JAIL

Had Been Sentenced To Five Years in Kingston and Thirty Lashes.

Sarnia, June 15.—The young man, Tracy, who hails from Petrolia, and who was confined in the county jail awaiting removal to Kingston Penitentiary, made a successful break for liberty Saturday night.

As soon as his absence was noticed by the local officers were informed, but as yet no trace of him has been found.

Tracy was found guilty of a charge of gross indecency on Friday, and was sentenced to five years and thirty lashes in Kingston Penitentiary.

Each of the city regiments will go 350 strong, including all ranks, with the exception of the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto, which will be 400 strong. They are ordered to arrive in Quebec on July 1st.

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MILITARY CORPS FOR TERCENTENARY

The Official List of the Various Forces To Be Represented

—12,000 in All.

Ottawa, June 15.—Military orders have been issued for the mobilization of about 12,000 troops of the Canadian militia at Quebec during the tercentenary celebration, under command of Brigadier-General Otter.

The troops will represent every branch of the Canadian forces, but will be confined to Eastern Canada, with the exception of a contingent of 175 of all ranks and 10 horses to be selected from the several units in the three military districts from Winnipeg west.
