## MAMMOTH COAL STRIKE MAY COME ON APRIL 1ST

**Entire Suspension of Operations in Great Bituminous Coal Fields is Threatened** -- National Convention of United Mine Workers Meeting Today in Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 12—The mational convention of the United Mine Workers of America met today in Tomlinson Hall, to agree upon a course of action because of the failure of the operators and miners of the central competitive field to agree upon a joint wage conference to fix a scale in place of the present one, which expires April 1. The wage cales for the various bituminous fields of the United States and Canada are based pon the scale fixed in the central competitive field, consisting of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois operators and miners would be held to be one unit, as would those of Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Texas, the competitive field of the southwest.

The fourth proposition will be an extreme peace measure, a provision that the present contract be continued for a month longer and the mines be kept in operation during that period.
