The Furness line steamship Shenandoah arrived in port this morning from London via Halifax, with a general cargo. She is discharging at the Corporation pier.  
The wholesale millinery openings are being held here today and quite a number of visiting milliners are in the city to get supplies and copy the new fall styles.  
The Orion male quartette will meet for practice tomorrow evening at the home of Samuel Holder, Cedar street. Plans for the winter will be discussed.  
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Y. Case will have the sympathy of their friends in the death of their infant daughter, Florence Louise, which occurred this morning at their home, 17 Brunswick street.  
The Temple of Honor intend giving a supper in their hall, north end, on Thursday, Sept. 23, in aid of the building fund. Preparations for a minstrel show to be given some time during the coming winter are now being made.

A fishing smack from Chance Harbor, is at Fredericton with a cargo of fish. The craft, which is called *The Clearwater*, is a gasoline two masted vessel and is the first fishing vessel to reach that port with a cargo of fish.  
Steamer *Senlac*, Captain Crossley, arrived in port this morning from Campbellton via Fort Hastings, N. S. She has been running on the north shore route to Gaspe, and other ports during the summer. She will be laid up here until next spring.

**DOCTORS FOR A MEDICAL INSPECTOR**

Text of Communication to School Trustees for Appointment of a "Civic Health Officer" Co-operation Asked

At the meeting of the board of school trustees held on Monday evening last, the following letter from the secretary of the New Brunswick Medical Society, advising the appointment of a medical officer for the public schools, was read and referred to the teachers' committee—  
St. John, N. B., Aug. 14, '09.  
Board of School Trustees,  
St. John, N. B.  
Dear Sirs:  
At the annual meeting of the N. B. Medical Society in St. John, July 20 and 21, the following recommendation was made, and I was instructed to forward the same to you, asking your co-operation in advocating the same to the local government.  
It is expedient and necessary that a properly qualified medical man, who might be known as the "Civic Health Officer," and whose duties should include those of examiner of public schools and school population, should be appointed for the city and county of St. John, and for other such large urban or rural centres as may be deemed in need of such an official. That this officer should be in a position to devote his whole time and attention to the prosecution of the duties pertaining to this office, so as to be able to control as far as may be, the origin and dissemination of disease in his community.
