testify of me," saith our Saviour; and when practicable (which is almost always the case) I conclude with prayer. This necessarily takes up some time, more than I anticipate, and I do not visit near as many families as I propose to do in the morning: however, I view it as a very important part of my work, and profitable, I trust, both to the families visited as well as to my own soul. I called at a school house about two miles from Stoney Creek or Williamsville, and requested the scholars to circulate that I should lecture there on the following evening, and went to the house of an old acquaintance near the village, where I was kindly received. Tuesday, 26th-Visited ten families in the neighborhood-in the evening attended at the school-house, where there were a good number of people. I sold at the houses and after the lecture this day, five bibles and thirteen testaments. Wednesday, 27th -Went to a Dutch settlement four or five miles distant, and visited several familes of Dutch Methodists and Menonists. I sold all the Dutch copies I had with me, and would have sold more had I got them. Thursday, 28th—Went to Hullsville, ten miles, where I was expected. In the evening had a goodly number to the lecture in the Wosleyan Chapel, where I endeavored to prove, from the sublimity, excellence of poetry, faithfulness of history, truthfulness of prophecy, grandeur of oratory, beauty of biography, success of its progress amidst opposition, &c., that God was its author; and endeavored to point its design and end, viz: Salvation from sin through a crucified Saviour. After the meeting, I sold about a dozen copies of the scriptures. Oh, may it be as bread cast upon the waters, which may be found after many days."
