"Dr. Beach outlined the plan of the proposed Health department as follows: A health commissioner to be appointed Greer, organizer and commander of the A health commissioner to be appointed by the governor, to be on the job all the time, with a \$4,000 salary, he to have five district assistants, inspectors or chiefs, with \$2,500 salary, who should be constantly on the move and in touch with every condition in their districts which in any way bore upon the public health.
