## \$5,000 VOTED FOR BRITISH SEAMEN

Grant Approved by City Council This Morning

## PETITION NOT GRANTED

No Refund of Paving Contributions for Union Street Property Owners—Revisers' Lists Available

A recommendation for a grant of \$5,000 for the British Seamen's Fund was approved by the common council meeting in committee this morning.

The appeal of the property owners in Union street for release from their obligations under the local improvements act and refund of money already paid was ordered filed without action.

Some question having arisen regarding the right of the citizens to secure copies of the revisers' lists, Commissioner McLellan said he had given instructions that they could be secured at cost from the printers.

Mayor Hayes extended an invitation to other members of the council to a reception which he will give in honor of the officers of the 168th battalion which will arrive here today.

Commissioner Russell moved that the city grant \$5,000 to the British Seamen's Fund, a fund for disabled sailors of both the navy and the mercantile marine. He reported that other cities had voted grants as follows: Moncton, \$10,000; Fredericton, \$100; Halifax, \$4,000 and Montreal \$10,000. Commissioner Fisher seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Commissioner McLellan reported that the attorney general and W. E. Foster wanted copies of the revisers' lists of voters but he had been told by H. H. McLellan, chairman of the board, that it would cost them \$5.00 each. The commissioner said this was not necessary and he had instructed the printers to deliver copies to any person who wanted them, at cost. He thought that the way should be made easy for checking the lists.

Owing to a meeting of the county council in the afternoon, it was decided to hold the weekly meeting of the city council at 11:30 a. m. Tuesday.

Commissioner McLellan drew attention to the excellent practical reform work being carried on by Mr. McCormack in the Glad Tidings Hall in Brussels street, and moved that \$100 be voted towards his expenses. Commissioner Wigmore, seconding, concurred and the motion passed unanimously.

The payroll for city employees engaged in work under the C. P. R. treaties, West End, was approved.

A request for financial aid for the apple show to be held by the N. B. Fruit Growers' association in St. Andrew's rink at the end of the month was ordered filed, with the understanding that the matter would be taken up later if the need is shown.

Commissioner Fisher brought up the petition of Union street property owners who asked that the payments under the local improvement act be discontinued and previous payments refunded. After discussion by Commissioner Wigmore and McLellan, it was decided to file the petition without action.

A letter was submitted from B. L. Gervais, solicitor for Miss K. Cline asking on her behalf compensation for injuries and loss of cause time caused by the depression in King street on September 11, 1914, when she was laid up for seven weeks, and again falling and spraining her foot at the corner of King square and Sydney street on September 2, from which she still is suffering. The letter was referred to the commissioner of public safety and the city solicitor.

Mayor Hayes referred to the expected arrival of the 168th Acadian battalion today and suggested a civic reception to the officers. Commissioner McLellan spoke in disapproval and His Worship announced that he would make the officers his personal guests and extend an invitation to the commissioners to be present.

## AUTO INTO BROOK DURING CLOUD BURST

Two Young Women and Young Man Injured Near Parrsboro

Parrsboro, N.S., Oct. 2.—Last night as a furious storm was raging, Arthur Cochrane of Fox River left Parrsboro in an automobile accompanied by the two daughters of Robert Salter of Diligent River. When they had reached Wharton, three miles from here, there was a regular cloudburst and their car plunged into a deep brook that crossed the road. It is believed that the bridge was carried out by the flood before they reached it or a heavy car crossed safely just before.

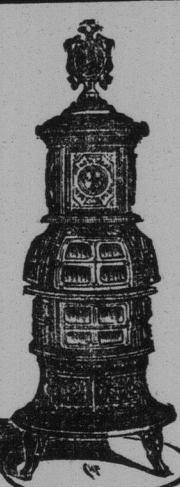
