TO OPEN EMPLOYMENT BUREAU TO PROCURE MUNITIONS WORKERS

Toronto, Nov. 8.—Premier Hearst tonight announced that the provincial government through Dr. W. A. Riddell, its recently appointed superintendent of the trades and labor branch, is about to open a public employment bureau in Toronto to meet the need of the department of labor of the imperial munitions board. Mark H. Irish, the director of the department, has reached the conclusion that the increased output asked for by the imperial authorities cannot be had except by a careful dilution of the male labor now employed with additional female help.
The munitions manufacturers are willing to provide the requisite accommodation for women wherever the work they are doing can be done by women. It is therefore expected that within the next three or four months many more women will be employed making munitions than at present.

White Collie Smoking a Pipe Thrills Automobile Row.

GOVERNMENT ENQUIRY INTO COST OF LIVING

U. S. Department of Justice Promises Punishment for Unjustified Increases.
Washington, Nov. 9.—The rising cost of living is being investigated by the government to ascertain whether the increasing prices are being pushed upward unlawfully. Wherever that is found to be the case, persons responsible will be punished to the full extent of the law, according to Attorney General Gregory. Agents of the department of justice particularly are seeking evidence of unlawful price increases through conspiracies of other means.
The attorney general authorized the following statement of his department's activities in that connection:
"The Department of Justice is investigating the recent abnormal and suspicious increases in the prices of various necessities of life, especially coal. Wherever any such increase is found to have been due to conspiracy or other unlawful action the department will invoke against the offenders the severest penalties which the law prescribes."

DECREASE IN PRICE OF RUBBER A GODSEND

The Average Man Has the British Government to Thank That It Has Not Risen in Price With Other Products.
If, ten years ago, any rubber manufacturer had been given an order for 2,000,000 pairs of rubber boots, of the hip length variety, he would have been forced to refuse the order, unless he were privileged to "farm it out." Seven thousand tons of rubber and other materials are necessary to manufacture 2,000,000 pairs of rubber boots and ten years ago it would have been next to impossible for a single manufacturer to lay his hands on that amount of the crude product.
Today, however, it is a different matter—no different in fact than such an order has just been given to a single manufacturer by the British government for boots for Britain's army. The name "British" appears still faintly in the transaction. It was through the foresight and sagacity of the British empire that this and other manufacturers of rubber articles have been able to supply the crude article with which to meet the demands of the public.
The why and wherefore of this date back to 1898, when wise men in authority in the British government conceived the idea of fostering the rubber industry by subsidizing plantations of rubber trees. This was a wild idea at first, in the minds of the average rubber man, who believed that rubber could come only from the wild trees of Brazil, but these Englishmen were different and today, not only the British empire, but the world is profiting by the foresight of these men.
This year's production of rubber will be well over 200,000 tons of crude rubber, while the South American production, which satisfied many, still remains the same and constitutes only 20 per cent of the total world's production of crude rubber.
But, this is the interesting part for the average person. Britain's rubber foresight has brought the market under her control and she has forced the price of crude rubber down from \$3 in 1910 and \$1.25 just before the war to about 67 cents today. In these days, when all prices are mounting, this is glad news for the man of ordinary means.
He is the man who buys rubber several times a year to keep himself dry—perhaps to keep the feet of a wife and one or two children from the damp and cold of winter. He is the man who knows what the increase in price of other articles means and welcomes the news that, at least, one article is decreasing rather than rising in cost.
He is the man who also knows that his shoe leather and that of his wife and children is mounting so rapidly that the buying of shoes for the family is a problem. Winter is coming and rubber and overcoats come with winter as a means to help solve this high cost of shoes, and he has to thank the British government for the control it has of the rubber market and the help it has been to the manufacturer, who might otherwise have had to put rubber in the same class as leather.

Tuberculosis Rapidly Increasing Among Children of Belgium and Northern France.

More Food Urgently Needed to Keep up Their Strength

An interview with Mr. W. L. Honnold, American Director of the Belgian Relief Commission, brings to light a new danger threatening the population of the territory occupied by Germany. Mr. Honnold reports that about 5,000,000 wholly or partially destitute people, who have been dependent on the Commission, generally show diminished vitality. The effects are most apparent among the older children, particularly those in the adolescent stage. Among these there is an alarming increase of tuberculosis, due to the lower power of resistance consequent on an inadequate diet.
To overcome this serious danger, the Commission appeals for extra contributions so that a special meal can be served every day in the schools. Efforts are also being made to provide as far as possible for children outside the schools.
