Halifax Recorder.—Manager Hall is
busy making preparations for the races
in connection with the Nova Scotia
Provincial Exhibition at Halifax, Sept.
8 to 16. He will have the track put in
first class shape, and in consequence
reports which were circulated that the
stables would not be suitable in con-
sequence of some sickness among the
horses that were quartered there this
winter prior to going to the war, he
has not only had the stables thoroughly
disinfected, but has had them examined
by the dominion inspector, who has
given them a perfect certificate of their
being free from any contagious or other
disease. He will, however, also take
the precaution of having them disinfected
a second time. He has arranged for the
programme of stake races in connection
with the seven days' Exhibition meet-
ing, and the purse races will be an-



nounced later. The stakes are as fol-

REVEALS HOW FRANCE

KEPT "75" GUN SECRET

Official "Traitor" Trick German Spies
With Another Cannon.

(Correspondence N. Y. Sun.)

Paris, March 18.—A very interesting
account of how the famous "75" gun
escaped being appropriated by the Ger-
man spying organization maintained in
France is told in Le Correspondant.

It was in 1898 that Commandant De-
port began and in 1894 that he finished
his work of constructing the gun that
has proved of incalculable assistance to
the allies. The fear of German spies
hindered, however, the process of the
experiments, and the question of how to
evade the spy-cry head of the Ger-
man spies in France was becoming of
the utmost importance.

The duty of leading the Germans up-
on the wrong track fell to General De-
bois, then head of the ordnance de-
partment. The plan he adopted was to or-
der one of his own confidential em-
ployees to play the role of traitor.

This man entered into negotiations
with a German colonel and was soon
able to take to him the model of a new
cannon which was then being construct-
ed at the government works at Puteaux.
General Deloye displayed a surprising
carelessness in making experiments with
a new gun, which it was loudly pro-
phesied, would revolutionize the artillery
equipment of the future.

Within a short time the German gen-
eral staff became persuaded that they
were in possession of France's greatest
military secret, and began the construc-
tion of their "77" cannon; but the truth
of the matter was that instead of the
models and plans of the "75" the Ger-
mans obtained the so-called Ducros gun,
while General Deloye proceeded to equip
the French army with the "75's."

The true facts were kept in such pro-
found secrecy that even in the budget
of the war secretary the new cannon
was styled "an improved type of the
Ducros gun."
