

BAXTER PROMISES LUMBER INQUIRY

Four Opposition Candidates Are Selected in Northumberland.

NEWCASTLE, July 24.—The Opposition party in Northumberland county met in convention here this afternoon and nominated S. D. Heckbert, of Chatham; J. Leonard O'Brien, of Nelson; Akerly Holmes, of Doaktown; and Frank Lavett, of Rogersville, as its candidates in the provincial elections to be held on Aug. 10, next. Eight names were submitted to the convention, the other four being those of Dr. W. B. Jones, of Chatham; C. E. Fish, of Newcastle; Mederic Chadsen, of Rogersville, and W. A. Bamford, of Doaktown. A single ballot sufficed, as the four men nominated obtained a majority of votes in the convention. E. W. Walling, of Chatham, and D. F. Doyle, of Newcastle,

also were nominated, but both withdrew for personal reasons. SEVERAL GIVE SPEECHES. The convention which opened in the Opera House about 2.30 o'clock, was said to be one of the largest and most enthusiastic in the history of the county. The hall was packed to capacity. The accredited delegates in attendance numbered about 180. The gathering was called to order by A. D. Holyoke, provincial organizer of the Opposition. DR. BAXTER SPEAKS. Hon. Dr. Baxter then addressed the delegates. He congratulated them on the size and enthusiasm of the convention. The same was true of all sections of the province, he said. Everywhere people were flocking to the banners of the Opposition party. He was confident that the ticket today elected would successfully contest the county on Aug. 10. Good organization and united efforts were necessary, he declared. The people were sick of the reckless extravagance of the Veniot Government and desired a change, he asserted. Business was stagnant under the burden of heavy taxation and the exodus of people from the province was increasing. GRAND FALLS DEVELOPMENT. Referring to the Grand Falls development, he stated that the Opposition were in favor of the project if it could be proved that it could be developed at a favorable cost so as to attract industries. If it could not pay its way it must not be gone on with, he declared. The project must be thoroughly investigated. The Opposition must know where the power to be developed can be sold and at what price. PROMISES LUMBER INQUIRY. The Government alleged that the Opposition party was in the hands of the lumbermen and the big interests. Dr. Baxter denied emphatically that any party or association had any strings attached to the Opposition. He stated that he, Baxter, had promised the lumbermen the Quebec scale. He had made no such promise nor did he intend to. He said that it was the intention of the Opposition, if elected to office, to investigate thoroughly the lumber industry in this province. It must be dealt with so that all might have employment, he said. The speaker declared that the affairs of the province would be administered in an economical manner if his party should be returned to power.

VET DIES OF EATING POISON.


