Mrs. Roberts has recently returned from visiting friends in Summerside, P. E. I., where she attended the closing exercises at Mt. Allison, where her daughters Miss Dorothy Roberts and Miss Virginia Roberts, have been students for the past three years. Miss Dorothy is a post-graduate of Mt. Allison and took up the university work during the past year, while Miss Virginia is a graduate in the art department at Mt. Allison. **REV. W. H. BARRACLOUGH GOES TO ONTARIO.**  
The annual meeting of the Central Methodist quarterly official board was held last evening in the church parlors, at which the reports of the various departments were received, showing the church to be in a flourishing condition. The total membership is now 560, a net increase of twenty-three. Thirty-five have been received by transfer and twenty-eight by profession of faith in the past year. Three hundred and fifty families are now attached to the church in a constituency of about 1,200. This report also showed that twenty-five had been baptized, twenty-three of whom were children.

This being the occasion of the Rev. W. H. Barraclough's last meeting with the board before leaving for his new church in upper Canada, each of the members of the board spoke most appreciatively of the pastor's services during his four years' ministry with Central, and all expressed their regret at his departure from Moncton. Mr. Barraclough, in reply, said he had enjoyed his pastorate here in every way and regretted his departure even more than any of his co-workers, even though he was returning to his native province. He said in closing that he had never been connected with a church where money had been donated so readily by the congregation.

**ST. JOHN'S ONE COMFORT.**
