Whitman, Mass., July 12.—Chief of Police L. L. Phinney has commenced a crusade on automobile parties who ride three on the front seat. He declares that a car cannot be operated safely under these conditions. Several parties have already been held up.

The chief maintains that it endangers the safety of the public, as well as the safety of the occupants of the machine. He says it is impossible to operate a car when three people, not unlike three pieces of tomato in a club sandwich, are jammed into a narrow space. The feet of the passengers interfere with the emergency brake and frequently the driver operates with only one hand. After warnings cases may be taken to court for judicial opinion.

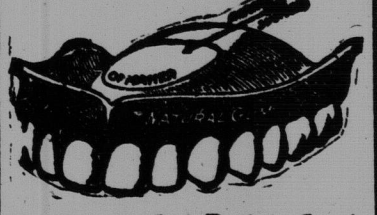
# WOMAN AERONAUT'S NARROW ESCAPE

Action Starts Week of Trouble in Ecuador—Sanguinary Encounter.
