Team to Olympic.
Boston, Nov. 18.—The Amateur Athletic Union voted to send an American team of athletes to Antwerp for the renewal of the Olympic games to be held there next year. The union also voted to recommend to the international Olympic committee that the Antwerp games be held between August 15 and September 1. The records of the year were passed upon, and all but two allowed. The union threw out the claim of Thomas Campbell, Chicago University, to credit for the 600 yards run indoors, and of the Yale team for the 200 yards relay swimming mark of one minute, forty-one seconds.

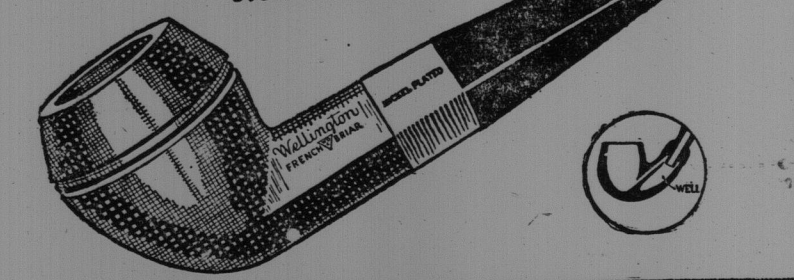
